HERE TO HAIL MISS BOOTH

SALVATION ARMY WORKERS COME FROM REMOTE POINTS TO SEE LITTLE COMMANDER.

Salvation Army workers from all the outposts of the army are flocking to Minneapolis to hear Commander Miss Eva Booth, who will speak at the Swedish Mission Tabernacle tomorrow evening. Brigadier W. F. Jenkins, who was formerly in command here, has come all the way from his province on the Pacific coast, and many more already have arrived from other stations. Miss Booth is making a tour of the country for the purpose of getting in touch with all the corps of her new command. Last night she spoke in Omaha before an audience of 6,000 persons. The smaller auditorium available here will limit her audience, and Brigadier Constant fears that some people will be turned away tomorrow night.

Miss Booth is a speaker of international reputation, and every place she goes thousands who are not directly connected with the army gather to hear her. Added to her powers of oratory, which alone are sufficient to attract large audiences, is her interesting personality. She is the youngest of the Booths and the last representative of the famous founder of the army in this country. Today the Salvation Army is one of the most potent factors in the religious life of this country. The army began its labors on this side of the Atlantic in 1851 and has long since passed the experimental stage. It is now looked upon by all denominations as filling an important gap in religious work. Its work is not in opposition to any creed, but is conducted among people who cannot be reached by the ordinary church methods.

Elaborate preparations are being made for the meeting. Mayor D. F. Jones will introduce Miss Booth, and welcome her to the city. A singing chorus will lead in the singing and the provincial brass band will contribute.

THE DIVINE "SARA" REACHES WINDY TOWN

Commercial, unartistic Chicago paused long enough in its money-getting to give a rousing reception to Sara Bernhardt, "the divine Sara," who will be the feature of the star course at the Auditorium here later in the season.

There was a rush into the track inclosure of the La Salle street station when the Bernhardt train arrived Monday afternoon after a record-making trip. There was another rush at the Grand opera house Monday evening when the great French actress opened her last American tour of the "La Sorciere" to a house filled with enthusiastic admirers.

Altho elaborate preparations had been made for her reception at the station, the crowd was so great that she was all but mobbed, and only the gallantry of a volunteer French body-guard, which joined hands and formed a cordon around their idol, permitted her to travel in the grandest of cars from her private car to her carriage, and the time consumed in the short journey was fifteen minutes.

The divine Sara did several charmingly characteristic things. She dodged the camera battery at the station by permitting her manager and her secretary to draw the fire; she tossed carnations into the crowd and waved cheerily; she stopped and shook hands with the engineer of the special and received another round of cheers, and then she stopped and gave a carnation to J. B. Elfreth, who interviewed her at 7th, when she first came to America. Altogether her reception at the station was a fitting finale to a journey most of which was made at the rate of a mile a minute.

When the curtain went up at the Grand opera house it was to find her the recipient of an ovation in which boxes, balcony, orchestra and gallery shared equally. Bernhardt remains in Chicago this week, after which she will tour the eastern cities, returning to the west in time for her Minneapolis engagement in February.


