SIX BIG WARSHIPS IN NAVAL PLANS

Three First-Class Battleships and Three Scout Cruisers Will Be Sought.

Washington, Nov. 23.—Three first-class battleships of at least 18,000 tons displacement and eighteen-knot speed three scout cruisers of 15,000 tons, one gunboat of the Helena class and four other gunboats of light draft, two for use in the Philippines and two for service on the rivers of China, with additional torpedo boats and torpedobomb destroyers, are the principal recommendations of the general board of the navy in its program of new construction to be authorized by the next congress, which is now under consideration by the board on construction. Although appreciating fully the necessity of scout cruisers in time of war, the need of an adequate force of destroyers and torpedobombs and the immediate desirability of small gunboats for service on the Asiatic station, several members of the board of construction are in favor of concentrating the fight for additional ships upon the first recommendation of the general board—that for three new battleships.

RAILROADS

FINE FOR BURLINGTON

Rumor Gives Road Short Line from Twin Cities to Denver.

Special to The Journal. Rapid City, S. D., Nov. 23.—New railroad rumors are heard here every day. There seems good reason to believe that the Great Northern will build from Aberdeen to this city in the near future and a connecting line with the Burlington and the Missouri River & Northwestern company is building between Rapid City and Mystic, a station on the main line of the Burlington in the Black Hills. This would give the Burlington a short line from the twin cities to Denver. It is known that men employed by the Great Northern have been in this city looking over the situation. The traffic arrangement between the Burlington and the Missouri River & Northwestern companies is such that Burlington trains can be run over the tracks of the latter.

When C. D. Crouch, who has been almost entirely responsible for the building of the Missouri River & Northwestern road, saw that the Milwaukee was looking for a terminus in the Hills, he went to Chicago and proposed to the officials of that company that he share the ground already secured for depots, shops, etc., for his own company, with the Milwaukee company and the proposition was accepted. Depots are to be used jointly by the two companies. Considerable ground has since been purchased jointly.

TO BUILD FROM EVARTS

Milwaukee's Coast Line Will Start from That Point.

Confirmation of The Journal's prediction that the Milwaukee road will build its Pacific coast line west from Everts, S. D., instead of Chamberlain comes from New York. Later a line will be built northwest to connect with the Pacific coast line from Minneapolis and Everts. This was also prophesied. It is 1,500 miles to the coast from Everts and it is expected that the line will be built at \$40,000 a mile, or for \$60,000,000.

Will Double-Track Line.

Fargo, N. D., Nov. 23.—There no longer seems any doubt about the Northern Pacific's double-tracking its line from Fargo eastward to Wadena, Minn., early next spring, in time to take care of the rush of business east of this point. There are so many trains out of Fargo and coming from the west that it is impossible to handle the passenger, stock and wheat business in addition to the regular freight traffic and keep the trains moving on time. It is thought that if the double track extended as far as Wadena the situation would be greatly relieved.

Chinamen Going Home.

Chinamen are buying drafts and preparing to go home to take part in the New Year's feasts at home. The Soo line took out eighty-six Chinamen for Vancouver yesterday. They came from all points east. One 20-year-old celestial from Chicago, dressed in fine raiment, said to the ticket agent: "Me goin' to blum." Last week 400 Chinamen were taken to Vancouver by the Canadian Pacific road.

Railroad Notes.

The Omaha road established new service to Marshfield, Wis., today. A new train to Minneapolis at 4:25 p.m. and returning will reach Minneapolis at 10:30 a.m. Train No. 13 from Chicago arrives at Minneapolis on account of the elimination of some stops from the time card.

Chinamen, Wyo., Nov. 23.—Senator F. E. Warren said in a speech here that it was time for the Colorado & Southern to extend its line thru Wyoming to Montana or Canada, and that if it did not intend to do so the states of Wyoming and Colorado would buy the road and build the extension themselves.

The Ohio road will bring the western students to the game with Minnesota Saturday. At least 150 will be in the delegation. The team will arrive tomorrow.

Railroad industrial agents will be entertained Monday in Chicago at a banquet to be given by the Trade Journal association.
