## FLOOD OF BIDS TO COME

SCORES WILL BE AFTER CITY CONTRACTS AT COUNCIL MEETING THIS EVENING.

Scores of bids will be submitted to the city council this evening, and the clerk will occupy so much time reading them that probably there will be little time left for other business. There will be bids for incandescent and flat-dome street lighting, including bids for furnishing 5,000 incandescent lampheads; bids for fire engines and other fire department apparatus; bids for the steel work on the Washington avenue bridge; bids for building the East Side police station; bids for bonding the city treasurer in the sum of \$200,000 and other bids for minor contracts.

Most interest centers in the incandescent lighting bids, as there is great curiosity to learn if the readvertisement will result in more favorable terms. It is generally believed that the Patterson company, holder of the

present contract, will come to the figures of the oral offer made to the committee on gas some time ago, which was \$12.40 a lamp a year for lighting and maintenance, exclusive of the cost of the gas.

Outside of the bids the principal matter before the council is the ordinance relating to the Great Northern terminal freight yards in Bryn Mawr to which there is now no great objection since the interests of the street railway company have been protected by cutting out the section providing that the company shall pay one-half of the cost of the Superior avenue bridge if it should in the future lay streetcar tracks across it.

## DISPUTES INDIAN'S CLAIM

William Beaulieu Declares Majority Not Represented by Wright.

Rev. Charles T. Wright, an Indian whose Indian name is Wan-bee-quad, or White Cloud, tells the Pioneer Press that he carries with him 388 signatures of full-blood Chippewas to a petition protesting against the recent allotment of lands at White Earth. This petition Mr. Wright will take to Washington in the hope of seeing the president and Secretary Hitchcock and inducing them to set aside the allotments. He asserts the allotments were unfair to the full-bloods, cutover tracts and undesirable pieces of land falling to them, while men of mixed blood, non-residents, and others got fine tracts covered with good timber. Mr. Wright is a minister of the Episcopal church at Cass Lake, an intelligent and educated man.

William Beaulieu of the White Earth reservation says, however, that Mr. Wright misrepresents the situation; that when a vote was taken recently at White Earth on whether the allotment should stand all but fifteen of the Indians interested stood for condemning the allotments. He does not believe that the secretary will make any changes in the action of the agent, Mr. Mitchell, who is credited with having administered the affairs of the agency with strict integrity in the past, who has the confidence of the Indians in a high degree, and who is believed to have conducted this allotment with absolute fairness. It may be that some of the mixed bloods got better land than some of the full-bloods, but this was no fault
