

Wheat Holds Up Well, Closes at 85c BULL MARKET CHANGE

Better Tone in the Speculative End and More New Buyers Come In.

Receipts Here Not Heavy and Only a Moderate Gain in Stocks.

Foreign News Rather Helpful to the Price—News of the Day.

Minneapolis Chamber of Commerce, Nov. 27.—Firmness ruled the wheat market here from the first of the session, some new buyers appearing in May, and sellers hesitating to go short in the face of the generally improved speculative world's shipments came out as predicted, 13,312,000 bu., against 13,880,000 last year, and 11,880,000 a year ago.

Minneapolis elevator stocks increased by 200,000 bu. for two days. At Port Arthur and Fort William stocks of Canadian wheat increased 300,000 bu. last week. This makes the total in store there 4,274,885 bu., against 4,040,902 a year ago.

Minneapolis received 871 cars, against 1,125, Chicago 160, against 52, and Duluth 231, compared with 256, Winnipeg got 451 cars, against 400.

Primary receipts were 1,745,000 bu. against 1,547,000. Clearances, 300,000 bu.

Table with columns: Dec., Open, High, Low, Today, Saturday, Year Ago. Rows: Minneapolis Oats, etc.




