TOILERS PARADE VIENNA STREETS

Social Democrats Make Huge Demonstration in Favor of Universal Suffrage.

Vienna, Nov. 28.—Some 200,000 representatives of the social democrats made a demonstration before the parliament buildings today, and paraded the streets of the capital in support of their demand for the election of members of the reichsrath by universal, equal and direct suffrage.

The demonstration was under the auspices of the social democrats. Most of the factories, and many of the shops and offices were closed. The procession mustered on Karlsplatz and headed by banners marched to the parliament building, where a meeting presented a petition for universal suffrage to the premier and presidents of both houses.

Parliament Opens. The Austrian parliament opened today in its history, as it will have to decide the question of suffrage and the nation's attitude towards Hungary.

Every Austrian male over twenty-four years of age has a vote, but the voters are divided into five classes and the votes cast by certain classes, notably the landed proprietors, various chambers of commerce, and urban dwellers are infinitely more effective in securing the election of a deputy than the votes cast by the ordinary people.

WARRANT FOR FUGITIVE Old Document to Be Presented to Iowa Historical Society.

IOWA CITY, IOWA.—An interesting document will be presented to the Iowa State Historical society one day this week by Judge S. H. Fairall, a veteran jurist of the Johnson county bench, now the oldest practicing attorney in Iowa City. It is a warrant issued by A. D. Stephens, justice of the peace of Johnson county, sixty-five years ago. It calls upon the sheriff or any constable of said county to arrest a fugitive negro, "Solomon, alias John," who, the warrant recites, is the "property of Jubal Early, of Pike county, Missouri."
