RAILROADS

NO GERMS LURK IN CARS ON ERIE

ALL TRAINS ARE COMPLETELY STERILIZED AFTER EACH TRIP.

Formaldehyde Gas Bath Is Given Each Car, Which Is Then Thoroughly Aired, Swept, Washed and Dusted—Novel Deodorizing Apparatus Keeps Air as Fresh as Out of Doors.

Special to The Journal. New York, Nov. 30.—The Chicago Limited on the Erie road now leaves Jersey City daily a thoroughly sterilized train. The daily routine of sterilization at the end of each round trip of 2,000 miles began Wednesday. Experiments to kill all disease germs and destroy bad odors have been in progress nearly a month. The Pullman company has consented that all bedding, clothing and hangings in their cars on these trains shall be submitted to the sterilizing process, as they are satisfied it makes traveling in such cars absolutely safe as to disease infection.

The process consists in mixing two chemicals so that a sort of formaldehyde gas bath is given each car. The car is tightly closed for the purpose. After the gas has done its work the cars are thoroughly aired, swept, washed and dusted, so that each car leaves the station absolutely free from germs of influenza, tuberculosis, typhoid or contagious diseases. This sterilizing process will soon be extended to other thru Erie trains.

A deodorizing apparatus has also been devised, that has been in use in fifteen Erie club, parlor and commuters cars. This apparatus is placed out of sight of passengers and gives off an odorless gas, which nullifies stale tobacco smoke or other offensive odors which may accumulate in the cars. This treatment will be extended to all the passenger cars in the Erie service. It is a process that has never before been attempted in railway service. After a night's treatment the air in the cars is as fresh as that out of doors.

Under the state laws of Texas and Kentucky, the sterilization of railroad cars is compulsory at periods of from three to fifteen days. The Erie management, believing that such laws will become a reality in many states, has taken a precautionary step to make passenger equipment absolutely healthful as well as comfortable for its patrons.

FACTORIES ON THE ERIE

Circular Shows Seventy-eight Industries Located Within Year.

The Erie road, thru its industrial department, has issued a circular of all the new manufacturing activities that have located on the line in the fiscal year ending June 30, 1905. Louis Jackson, formerly with the Milwaukee road, is at the head of this branch of the Erie's traffic business. The list shows a great diversity in products put out by these companies, and the total showing appears worthy of much commendation. Seventy-eight industries are in the list and only about 25 per cent of these are duplicates. Cuts of three leading factories are shown, manufacturing soap, oxalic acid and worsted.

The soap factory, at Babbitt, N. J., will be the largest in the world. The oxalic industry is new in America. The plant will be at Bradford, Pa. The worsted plant at Garfield, N. J., will employ 1,000 hands or more.

MORGAN GETS C. H. & D.

Erie Directors Hand Back Great Central System, Causing Gossip.

New York, Nov. 30.—Erie railroad directors yesterday, politely handed back to J. P. Morgan the Cincinnati, Hamilton & Dayton "Great Central" system, which the Hollins crowd got from Zimmerman and Morgan got from Hollins and the Erie got from Morgan two weeks ago. Morgan had an offer of \$1,000,000 to get control, and now he will have to find another purchaser.

The explanation offered by the Erie directors was that they were the already heavily burdened Erie and had been further aroused by the insurance revelation from Chicago to St. Augustine, Fla., sawing a million out of both ends of the deal.

COMPANY SUES COUNTY

Helena Concern Claims to Have Paid Excess in Taxes.

HELENA, MONT.—The Missouri River Power company, owning a great dam across the Missouri river at Oaouan Ferry, eighteen miles northeast of Helena, which furnishes light and power to the East Helena smelter and power for the Amalgamated Copper company mines in Butte, has been suit in the district court here against County Treasurer Seales to recover a large sum paid in taxes under protest. The company claims that Assessor Tibbitts voluntarily raised the assessment upon the dam, power plant and pole line from \$407,621 to \$782,000, and that it paid \$4,017 extra taxes as a result of the assessor's action. As many of the persons interested in the power company are also interested in the Helena Transmission Power company, which is building another big dam across the Missouri a few miles below the present one, to supply more power to Butte

and Anacondas, not a few fear that the result of this excessive tax agitation may injure the success of that enterprise.
