Real estate board politics are beginning to seethe. The annual election of officers will be held the second Wednesday in January, and the names of nominees must be posted ten days before-hand. The election comes in the midst of the slack season, and for that reason the members of the board have a little time for the zest of wire-pulling on a mild scale.

S. S. Thorpe, who has served two terms as the retiring president. Several persons have been suggested as suitable man to head the organization. Much of the work of the board must originate with the president, and for that reason it is an important selection that devolves on the board members when it comes to nominate a successor to Mr. Thorpe. The mantle of president generally falls on a man who is not seeking the place. Politics in the board has never reached the aggressive stage that half a dozen members are in active canvass for the position, but the election this year promises to bring out more active competition for office.

Many opportunities are open for the board to immortalize itself by initiating reforms that lie within the function and the interest of the board. Many of the present beneficial changes in laws and the activity against violation of the smoke ordinance may be traced to the Minneapolis real estate board as a source. Whoever is made president of the board will find plenty of openings for the expenditure of energy.

In Mr. Thorpe's regime the board has had several pleasant surprises, including the famous trips to Winnipeg and to Duluth, and the iron range. Several pleasant luncheon meetings have been held and the reform movements that have started in these gatherings have been important in their scope and results.
