LABEL CLAUSE ILLEGAL

JUDGE HOLT DENIES PRINTERS' MANDAMUS BUT CONDEMNNS UNION LABEL ORDINANCE.

Judge Andrew Holt of the district court has denied the application of the Great Western Printing company for a writ of mandamus to compel certain city officials to sign a contract with the company for city printing.

While the validity of the union label resolution was not a direct issue, it was discussed in the arguments before the court, and in his memorandum Judge Holt commented on the question as follows:

"Not only law but common fairness would seem to require a holding that the resolution of the municipality restricting bidders for its work to those who can stamp it with the label in question is as unsond and vicious as would be a resolution that none who can use such label shall bid on the work."
