## CAPITOL SHOULD BE OPEN SUNDAY

SO SAY MORE MINNEAPOLIS ART ENTHUSIASTS. Harrington Beard, T. B. Walker, Robert Koehler and Miss Florence Roberts are unanimous in the belief that Art Treasures Should Be Accessible to Those Who Work All Week.

Minneapolis art patrons and enthusiasts seem to be of one voice in their sentiment that the art gallery at St. Paul should be kept open Sundays and holidays for the education and enjoyment of the general public. "The sociology of the nation in this bustling twentieth century calls for a fitting observance of the Sabbath aside from the religious side of it (which, however, I thoroughly approve). It should be a day of rest, when all business is laid away, and just as sincerely as I believe in the proper observance of Sunday, do I believe that anything which tends to the elevation of the intellect, such as the educational viewing by the public of the beautiful paintings at the capitol and that magnificent 'frozen music,' as architecture has been fittingly called, is essential to our busy life and should at every opportunity be cultivated. For this reason, in my opinion, the capitol should be kept open Sundays, that the thousands who work eight to ten hours a week may have the opportunity of Sundays of the perfect art enjoyment which the building affords, in fitting, quiet observance of the day."

T. B. Walker's View. T. B. Walker, whose private art gallery is famous, said today: "I believe every building which contains valuable works of art should be thrown open to the public; but especially should this be true of any public buildings at all times. What building should the public have a better right to visit than the state capitol, built with taxes the people have paid? I fully indorse the proposition that the capitol should be open Sundays that its rich works of art may be viewed by one and all who are unable to take this advantage week days, because of their own business or their daily occupations. Said Robert Koehler, director of the Minneapolis School of Fine Arts: "I am decidedly in favor of the proposition to keep the capitol open Sundays and all holidays. I think there can be found proper means to suppress and keep out hoodlums who would do damage. Every public spirited citizen who visits the building would aid in this good work. There is nothing more beautiful in Minnesota than the capitol. Every opportunity should be given visitors to take in its beauties. All over the world art galleries and museums are open Sunday afternoons, and in many instances open on Sunday. This should be the case in Minnesota. Expense Worth While.

Miss Florence Roberts, supervisor of drawing in the public schools today said: "It would be a fine thing to have the Minnesota capitol open Sundays and holidays. Of course the expense is to be considered, the heating, lighting and employees, but it does not seem that this cost would be in any excess of the benefit the public generally would receive. There are paintings in our capitol by the best artists in the world. There is no question about the great educational influence of such a building if it were open to the people. Such things are very elevating to those of low as well as those of high degree. For instance, in Baltimore the criminal court room, especially its large waiting room, is magnificently decorated, with the point in view of the good influence its art richness will wield. "In Europe, Sundays and holidays are the great occasions for the people to visit the museums and art galleries which are always open. This is also especially true of places in our own country. The Art Institute gallery at Chicago, for instance. "Every opportunity should be given the people to see Minnesota's new capitol."

Governor Favors Open House. "I do not care to discuss the subject," said Governor Johnson today, "except to say that in my judgment the building ought to be kept open on every holiday. It is an opportunity for people who are busy at all other times to inspect the beauties of the building, and to see the works of art brought by the state for the education and improvement of the public mind."

## OFFICIALS REFUSE LA FOLLETTE'S DEMAND

## DISCUSS OLD TIMES

Hennepin County Pioneers Enjoy Their First Winter Reunion. The first winter reunion of the Hennepin County Territorial Pioneers association, held last evening in McElroy's hall, Nicollet avenue and Eighth street, was in every way a success. Pioneers whose arrival in Minnesota dates back to the fifties and then some, and who now hail from every part of the state were present. J. E. Bell, president of the association, presided. After explaining the purpose of the association and its aims he extended a hearty welcome to the guests and their friends. C. F. Staples of West St. Paul, president of the Minnesota Pioneers association, gave some interesting experiences and reminiscences of pioneer life. L. A. Larpen of St. Paul added other reminiscences. Mr. Bell gave an interesting and entertaining talk and was followed by Major Edwin Clark, who read letters from a number of pioneers of note, expressing their regrets that they could not be present. The work of two junior pioneer organizations was explained by President Bell. One is known as the Junior Pioneers association and is composed of natives of the state over 21 years of age. The Native Sons of Minnesota is composed of natives of the state over 35 years of age. To become a member of the territorial associations, either state or county, the applicant must have been a resident previous to 1858. Lunch was served following the exercises and the hall was cleared for a good old-fashioned dance.

## MRS. BRENNAN IS A CONVICT IN PEN

Murderer of Stepchild Begins Life Sentence at Stillwater Penitentiary. Special to The Journal. Stillwater, Minn., Jan. 3.—Mrs. Stella Brennan, sent to the penitentiary for life, for the murder of her stepchild, began serving her sentence yesterday afternoon.

She arrived here at 2 o'clock in charge of Sheriff Dreger, Jailer Nels Clausen and Mrs. Mary Woodburn, and was taken to the penitentiary and assigned to cell No. 7. She was given a gingham dress of gray and brown checks and worked at some sewing till the evening. She still maintains a remarkably calm demeanor. Her reception was no different from the usual routine and the woman enters on her convict life with all the rigors of the institution. Works in Cheerful Ward. The female ward at the prison differs in a large measure from the several male wards. The cells are more cheerful and the workroom is large and light. The female prisoners are allowed to converse, a privilege that is denied the male inmates. To the matron and all others with whom she conversed during the afternoon and evening, she protested her innocence and expressed hope of a new trial, when she said she would be able to prove to the world that she had not taken the lives of James Brennan's three children. She ascribes her conviction to the testimony of little Tommy Brennan, who she says was coached to tell the stories he did by detectives who were anxious to convict her.

## HURD IS APPOINTED
