

ROCKEFELLER RIVAL OF STINGY RUSSELL SAGE

"Now that John D. Rockefeller is busy dodging subpoenas and dare not reveal his whereabouts by coming out and boldly denouncing me, I feel that I am safe in telling of this about the Standard Oil magnate that is his never occurred to me to tell before."
 Miss Francesca Redding, styled the "stunningest" of her branch of the theatrical profession, who is now entertaining the large audiences at the Orpheum theater, thus delivered herself today and continued with a true story of John D. Rockefeller's beneficence, worthy of Russell Sage.
 "It was at Tarrytown, N. Y., where Mr. Rockefeller maintains a magnificent place, and to scores of others the richest families of New York," said Miss Redding. "My brother, the late Rev. A. H. Redding, rector of St. Mark's Episcopal church, had in his parish many members of the Rockefeller household and, of course, came to know a great deal of the oil king.  "My brother was not home at the time, so I instructed our man, Albert, to take the present to the rear and open it. Not until my brother arrived did I think again of the surprising incident. When he entered I informed him that Mr. Rockefeller had sent a barrel to him. "Did you expect it?" I asked. He said that he had not. The man was called and stated that the barrel contained apples. What prompted the query, I do not know, but it occurred to my brother to ask the quality of the fruit. "Half rotten or wormy," was the perfunctory answer of Albert, a smile stealing over his face.
 "Half indignant and half hurt, my brother ordered the man to replace the head of the barrel, return it immediately to Mr. Rockefeller and tell him personally that 'Mr. Redding is able to buy all the rotten apples his family may desire.' The man performed the service.

 "Go on, Dick," whispered the warden in reply. "It's good practice for you. The doors are guarded and if any of the audience try to get away they'll be shot in their tracks. Besides some of them are bad prisoners and if you make them suffer it will be good punishment for them to enjoy your presentation."
 Mr. Outcault did "pitch in," but his entertainment didn't injure any of the prisoners. On the contrary it was voted such a success that he has had to visit the penitentiary at least once a year since then and give the convicts an evening's entertainment.
