J. Krafoe, Dr. C. J. Ringnell and J. J. Young were elected counsellors for three years, with Dr. C. J. Ringnell as legal trustee.

NEW WHITE BEAR CHURCH

The Fulton Family Will Build It as a Memorial.

White Bear is to have a new Episcopal church to take the place of the Church of St. John in the Wilderness. The old church will be removed to a new location and used as a chapel, while the new one will be erected on the old site by T. C. Fulton and other members of the Fulton family as a memorial to their mother.

It will be of the English Gothic style of architecture, the material to be of pressed brick, with Bedford cut stone trimmings. The open ceiling will be finished in Washington air. There will be twenty art glass windows. The dimensions will be 30x60 feet, giving a seating capacity for about 100 persons. It will be heated by hot air and lighted by electric light. The interior finishings will be hardwood. Thori, Alban & Fisher of St. Paul are the architects.
