U. S. SURVEYORS' OFFICES TO CLOSE

Federal Jobs in Minnesota and the Dakotas Likely to Be Abolished.

Washington, Jan. 11.—There is good prospect that by the end of the fiscal year 1907, June 30, the offices of United States surveyors general for Minnesota and the Dakotas will be abolished, because the work of surveying the public lands in those states will have been wound up by that time. Several years ago Surveyor General Eli Warner of Minnesota urged an allotment for completing the surveys in his state, of which very little remained to be done. In his report for the fiscal year 1905, Commissioner Richards of the general land office says of the situation in Minnesota: "In the district of Minnesota, as the apportionment for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1906, will probably complete the surveys, the surveyor general submits no estimate for public-land surveys for the year ending June 30, 1907. He anticipates that the office work on surveying can be completed during the fiscal year 1907, and the office be discontinued at the close of that fiscal year."

North Dakota Surveys.
Of the surveys in the Dakotas the report says: "The surveyor general of North Dakota makes no estimate for public land surveys in his district for 1907, as all the uncompleted public land surveys are covered by outstanding contracts, leaving to be provided for only the unsurveyed lands in Fort Berthold, Standing Rock and Turtle Mountain Indian reservations. "Upon completion of the surveys of these Indian reservations the surveyor general's office may be discontinued and the surveying archives transferred to the state as required by law. "The surveyor general of South Dakota reports the surveys in his district to be confined mostly to Indian reservations, there remaining very little un-

I cannot see the difference between a man who dodges a subpoena to testify and one who runs away from a warrant for his arrest. "The case we have in hand is very simple. The state of Missouri alleges that certain corporations doing business in our state are in a combination or pool in violation of the law. We have come to New York to take the evidence of the officers and directors of these companies. If they are not in combination, there would be no reason for refusing to answer questions or for running." The best subpoena sluths in New York were started out again today after H. Clay Pierce, the man most wanted. He was president of the Waters-Pierce Oil company of Missouri, one of the principal defendants named. There is common knowledge that this company was bought up by the Standard, and to prove it by legal evidence is a most difficult matter. Mr. Pierce has a house at Tuxedo, but in winter lives in the Waldorf Astoria. Subpenas served on him there last week, but by locking himself in a bathroom he escaped service until the intruders were driven away. A few days ago that he had fled his yacht, but information secured today led to the belief that he still is hiding in the hotel or some nearby place. Two prominent men of Cleveland have fled before the Missouri subpoenas. They are W. T. McKee, vice president, and W. E. Judd, secretary and treasurer of the Republic Oil company.

STOCK SWINDLERS REAPED, ABROAD

Million Lost by Foreign Investors in Forged N. & W. Shares.

New York, Jan. 11.—Cable dispatches from London, Liverpool, Paris and Berlin indicate that the forgery of 100 share certificates of Norfolk & Western common stock has been vastly more profitable to the conspirators abroad than here. Just how many of the certificates were put in circulation there has not yet been disclosed, but there is reason to believe that foreign bankers and brokers have lost \$1,000,000 or more. The forged certificates have been in existence more than six months. One of the conspirators tried to negotiate a loan on one of the certificates early last summer. A down-town brokerage house, one of whose members inspected it, declined to make the loan. If the firm suspected that the certificate was not regular it made no report to that effect. The plotters tried to dispose of the spurious certificates in Philadelphia, Pittsburgh and Cleveland. Just how successful they were is not yet known, but it is certain they obtained large loans on the few that have thus far been traced. When the conspirators found that they could not flood this country with the counterfeit certificates two of the gang went to London with a big package of forged certificates. Bankers and brokers in many of the large cities of England and the continent are understood to have made loans on a considerable number of the counterfeits. The two swindlers have not returned to this country. Arrest is Made.
New York, Jan. 11.—Following the arrest today of Samuel Humphreys, a "newspaper writer," on a charge of selling a bogus certificate of 100 shares of the Norfolk & Western to a dealer

in securities in this city, it was learned that 500 of the bogus certificates were printed and that the operations appear to have been planned on a large scale. As only four or five of the certificates have been discovered, and each of them is for 100 shares with an aggregate market value of about \$5,000, it is evident that the amount realized by the operators is very large if they have disposed of many of the certificates. The police say that they believe that at least three men had a hand in the transaction. Humphreys was arraigned on an affidavit alleging that he acted in concert with C. Augustus Seaton in selling a forged certificate to Barnard & Clark of this city, last September, for \$8,000. He was held in \$2,500 bail for examination tomorrow. In default of bail he was remanded to police headquarters. Springfield, Ill., Jan. 11.—Governor Deen, although he has issued no formal order, has notified the officials and employees of all the state departments under his control and of the state charitable, penal and reformatory institutions that they must not ask or accept passes from railroads. They also must make affidavit as to their traveling expenses.
