Harvard Radicals Fire a Bomb in Football Circles

President Eliot Says Game Must Be Greatly Changed or It Will Be Barred Forever at Cambridge.

Cambridge, Mass., Jan. 15.—The death knell of intercollegiate football at Harvard was apparently rung by the statement from the board of Harvard overseers that Harvard was not to be allowed to play any more intercollegiate football.

Eliot Still Radical. "I for one shall never consent to intercollegiate football being resumed at Harvard until it has been demonstrated in actual play that the objectionable features of the game have been ruled out."

CORNELL CALLS BLUFF


