New York, Jan. 19.—Terry McGovern and Batting Nelson are likely to fight in Philadelphia after all, judging by developments today.

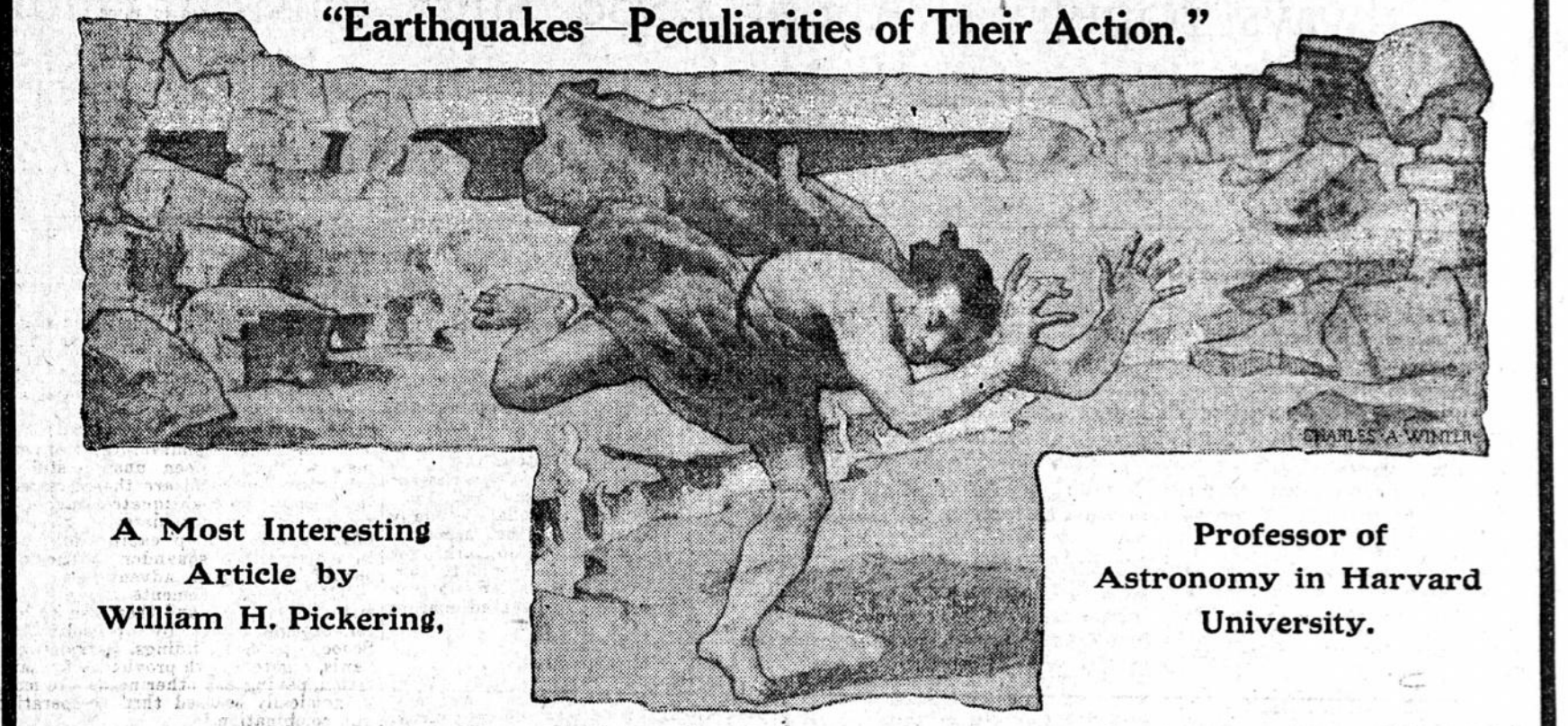
