MIDDIES DISCLOSE HAZING BRUTALITY

STOCK GROWERS TALK DRAINAGE. Fargo Convention Indorses Grain Inspection Bill and Other Important Measures.

Fargo, N. D., Jan. 19.—President Hill of the Great Northern failed to attend the Fargo today, but sent a paper which was read at this afternoon's session of the Tri-State Grain and Stock Growers' convention by President Worst.

The first paper was by L. C. Johnson of Fargo, giving the results of reclaiming flooded lands by drainage. He said that some fields where weeds would not grow had produced magnificent crops after only one year's drainage.

Emphatic protests were made in resolutions adopted by the convention, against the action of the boards of trade in Minneapolis and Duluth, in refusing seat to the Minnesota Farmers' exchange of representatives of the independent elevator interests of the Dakota and Minnesota.

AMERICAN COURSE FOR CZAR FOUND

Tender of Good Offices in Recent Rebellion Has Created a Friendly Attitude.

San Domingo, Jan. 19.—The Dominican government, in receiving the surrender of Monte Christi, permitted the revolutionary governor, General Arias, to depart for Porto Rico and granted general amnesty to the other revolutionists.

The collapse of the revolution within a few days from the commencement of hostilities was due to lack of funds and the inability of the revolutionists to control customhouses as bases for their operations.

ESTIMATES FALL FAR FROM FACTS. Continued From First Page. The number of swine at 37,000,000 while the census showed it to be 33,000,000; on cattle other than milch cows the bureau estimated the number at 28,000,000 and the census figures were 31,000,000.

Farm Animals. "Making full allowance for the difference in farm animals due to the seasonal increase in the five months from Jan. 1 to June 1, less the decrease by slaughter and otherwise, during the same period," says the report, "these discrepancies are too great to be susceptible of excuse."

Method of Censused. "We should expect, in figures arrived at from percentage estimates, comparing the number of domestic animals in any year with the preceding year, and so on for a series of years, wide divergences from actual figures when checked up against the results of a farm to farm enumeration once in ten years by the bureau of the census."

What Wilson Says. As to the recommendations of the commission looking to an improvement in the work of the statistical bureau, Secretary Wilson declared that many of the changes suggested actually had been made in the department and were now and had been for a long time in force.

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DYNAMITE BOMB FOR CZAR FOUND

Russian Watchman Killed by Infernal Machine Evidently Intended for Emperor.

Vienna, Jan. 19.—A St. Petersburg telegram says another dynamite box has been discovered, which no doubt was intended for an attempt upon the life of the czar.
