Railroads

BIG ADDITIONS TO WESTERN ROADS

THREE SYSTEMS ADDING THOUSANDS OF MILES TO THEIR LINES.

Milwaukee, Coast Line, Great Northern's Columbia River Division, and New Gould Coast Line Mean 3,000 Miles of New Road at Cost of Hundreds of Millions.

New York, Jan. 19.—Three great railroad projects are under way in the far northwest. They involve the construction of 3,000 miles of line and the expenditure of hundreds of millions of dollars. They are the extension of the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul line from the Missouri river to Seattle, the building of a Great Northern line from Spokane to Portland, down the north bank of the Columbia river, and the Western Pacific's line from San Francisco to Salt Lake City, another great link in the Gould ocean-to-ocean system.

These are not paper railroads. Construction is actually going on, and the forces behind the enterprises are the kind that do not stop short of completed work.

The three lines mean the opening of tremendous possibilities. The Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul line will be at least 1,200 miles long and will tap rich mining regions in Montana and Idaho, and the great "Inland Empire" of Washington and Oregon. Moody's Magazine is responsible for the statement that the yearly revenue from the farms of this only partially occupied empire is already \$75,000,000, and the territory is being occupied by 50,000 more people yearly. The road, however, is counting largely on thru traffic, as well as on the local traffic of the new country the road will help to develop.

The Great Northern's new line will cover 850 miles and will tap new areas of the same rich empire. The construction of this line will be expensive, but the territory is sure to develop with great rapidity and feed and be fed by the line to the mutual advantage of both territory and railroad. Work is already under way.

The Western Pacific, also under construction, means an outlay of \$100,000,000 for a direct line of at least 850 miles across California, Nevada, Utah, and for 500 miles of feeders. The line will originate much local traffic in California, especially in the Sacramento valley. It will also tap a rich gold district and mining territory in Nevada, also the irrigated district of Carson, Nev. The great significance of the Western Pacific is seen in the fact that it completes the toy system between Pittsburg to the Pacific, and when an eastern link is added will complete, unless some other system gets ahead of it, the first ocean-to-ocean system in the United States.

BURLINGTON REACHES OUT

Road Will Extend Cody Line to Workland, in Wyoming.

Amended articles of incorporation of the Big Horn branch of the Burlington system, filed at Cheyenne, Wyo., authorize the company to extend the Cody line to Workland, in Wyoming, at the junction with the Union Pacific line. This will bring the line close to Shoshone, established by the North-Western road in the Shoshone reservation. The road is to be built in a southeasterly direction to the Colorado state line, where it is believed that connection will be made with the Santa Fe system. The road, under construction south from the Union Pacific line at Walcott.

FARMERS' COURSE POPULAR

Registration at School of Agriculture Shows Large Attendance.

The registration in the department of agriculture of the university for the second semester shows a large attendance. The four-year college course has an attendance of forty-six students, who are taking advanced agriculture after the completion of the three-year school course. The school has 532 students; the dairy course for professionals, 88, and the six-weeks lecture course for farmers, 74. The special judging course which begins Feb. 19 will include three days' work in judging corn and other grains, two days' work in judging dairy cattle, and nine days' work in judging the different classes of livestock, two days being given to sheep, two to swine, two to beef cattle, two to horses and one to the judging of carcasses.
