MISSISSIPPI GIRL'S DEATH IS STILL A MYSTERY

UNFORTUNATE YOUNG WOMAN LAST SEEN ALIVE AT NEKOOSA LATE THURSDAY AFTERNOON AND SUSPICION GROWS THAT SHE WAS DRUGGED OR HAD BEEN MURDERED—VIGOROUS INVESTIGATION BEING CONDUCTED. Grand Rapids, Wis., Jan. 25.—A coroner's jury returned a verdict in the case of Lulu Ostrum of Nekoosa to the effect that she met her death on the night of Jan. 18 and Jan. 19 by being in the woods about ten miles southeast of Nekoosa and by means unknown.

MANKATO, MINN.—A railway company has been obliged to refuse ice cut for it at Minnesota lake because of the schools of minnows which are present in the lake. BURIED IN COAL PILE Iowa Fireman Has Narrow Escape from Terrible Death. IOWA CITY, IOWA.—J. W. Wanning of Iowa City, a prominent citizen, was narrowly escaped being buried alive. For an hour and a half he was a prisoner in a coal pile. He had taken a train to Manila to all the tender with coal. He stood on the ground in front of the train, and the chute over- as he did so, he slipped and plunged to the bottom of the tender, and over him was poured tons of coal. Fortunately he fell with his feet in front, and was enabled to stand upright. The railroad crew started to dig him out, but he was unable to breathe in a few moments. It required one and a half hours' labor on the part of the firemen before he was extricated from his serious position. He escaped with a few bruises.
