PURE FOOD'S FOES RELY ON SENATE

Packers Join Whisky and Other Interests in Opposing the Bill.

Special to The Journal. Chicago, Jan. 26.—A Washington special to the Chicago Tribune says: There is to be a long, hard-fought fight before any pure food bill can get through this congress.

Some of the packers, compounders of whisky and other interests, have representatives here now, and the fight has not reached an acute stage, there are indications that certain senators are preparing to oppose the bill on general principles. It was shown at first that the packers are not generally opposed to a pure food bill, provided it did not attempt to interfere with the use of harmless preservatives.

Loophole for Packers. To provide for the packers a special section was inserted in the Hepburn bill, which exempts from the prohibition of the proposed law the temporary preservatives which are washed off the outside, or which are so applied that they do not enter into the composition as a food product.

Opposition to the pure food bill, however, has been growing, not among the class of manufacturers and dealers who want to deal rightly with the public, but among those people who have been committing frauds and who insist they shall not be interfered with.

Senator McCumber, the other day, gave to the senate a hint as to the reason for the opposition by the packing house people. He quoted a report from the food commissioner of his own state, North Dakota, which hit the packers between the eyes and which apparently expressed the feeling of those opposing the pure food bill so vigorously.

Other Foes of Bill. Some of the patent-medicine people who are fighting the pure-food bill because they insist on the abstract right of adulteration. It is a well-known fact that some of these articles contain ingredients which are extremely dangerous. It is claimed that there are preparations which depend for their success upon narcotics and which are prescribed by any reputable physician except in serious cases; that people begin using these remedies without the slightest idea of what they contain, and when they acquire the opium or cocaine habit, and when it is too late, find it impossible to break off.

PATENT OFFICE MORE THAN PAYS EXPENSES

Washington, Jan. 26.—In his annual report to congress for 1905 the commissioner of patents sets forth the imperative need of an increased force and additional office facilities to cope with the business which, the report says, has shown a remarkable increase during the last year.

In 1905 there were received 54,034 applications for mechanical patents, 751 design patents, 156 reissues of patents, 16,224 applications for registration of trademarks, 1,068 labels and 467 prints. There were 30,270 patents issued, including designs. The total receipts were \$1,806,758; the expenditures, \$1,479,638.
