Varsity Basketball Prospects Are Fine

Quint Gets Championship Form—Track Men Awake—Baseball Boom Opens.

Disappointed by the non-appearance of the Purdue team Friday night, basketball enthusiasts at the university had only one chance last week to see their favorites in action.

One thing, however, has strengthened the belief of varsity rooters in the strength of the team—the remarkably good form shown in practice.

Line-Up Nearly Fixed.

With the exception of the center position on the team it may be said that the line-up of the varsity for 1906 has been definitely decided.

The fight for the center position is between Louis Larson and Ely. In the practice games of the season Ely has been used in preference to Larson, but the contest for the place is close and either may be chosen to represent Minnesota in the big nine games.

The regular intercollegiate season at the university will be opened next Friday night, when the Purdue team will appear for the game postponed from last Friday.

Track Men Wake Up.

Track men at the university are beginning to overhaul spiked shoes and athletic paraphernalia in readiness for the coming season.

Track team prospects are not bright. This is admitted on all sides, but it is generally conceded that with Groves and Dougherty on the squad Minnesota is at least assured of a creditable showing at the Chicago meet.

The 1906 team will be the first regular team to represent the university for three years, and it is generally understood that the future of baseball at the university will depend in a great measure on the showing, financially and otherwise, made by the team this year.

Hundreds to Roll in Big Bowling Tourney

Special to the Journal. Chicago, Jan. 27.—Louisville has at last outlined its plans for holding the next bowling tournament and shown the way it intends to use two extra alleys and three more days which were granted by the American Bowling Congress.

The extra accommodation, it is figured, represents an increase over the Milwaukee tournament of 140 clubs, 280 doubles and some 500 individuals.

Would Dump Losing Venture on Faculty

Northwestern University's Athletic Association Would Give Up When Deep in Hole.

Chicago, Jan. 27.—Northwestern University Athletic association is in a bad financial way, and its officials say that its only salvation lies in the university assuming charge of the entire management.

The management, they say, must include control of the athletic teams and the finances as well.

If the recommendation ordered at the recent meeting of the college conference, that the institution itself assume the management of athletics be carried out at Northwestern, it will be what the members of the Evanston association have for a long time striven for.

Not only has the university heretofore always refused the responsibility of the management, but has likewise refused to be liable for any of the financial obligations.

As a result of the unsuccessful season of the football team last fall, the Northwestern association ended up with a debt in the amount of \$12,000. This was due to opening and fitting up the new athletic field, which was done at an expense of \$25,000.

Of this amount \$13,000 was contributed by private subscriptions, and the rest assumed by the athletic association. As the football team came about financially, it left the debt on the shoulders of the association.
