

### BONAPARTE TO TALK TO THE MIDSHIPMEN

Annapolis, Md., Jan. 29.—Secretary of the Navy Charles J. Bonaparte has decided to come to Annapolis on Feb. 12, the occasion of the graduation of the first class of midshipmen from the naval academy, and will deliver an address and present diplomas to the graduates. It will be the first opportunity Mr. Bonaparte has had to address the student body.  
The authorities today announced the acquittal of Richard Ray Mann, midshipman first class, who was tried by the court-martial on the charge of hazing. Mann is from Washington D. C., and is a presidential appointee.

## PURE FOOD BILL'S OUTLOOK HOPEFUL

Senator McCumber Expects Early Vote on Pet Measure—Discusses Its Enemies.

Washington, Jan. 29.—Senator P. J. McCumber of North Dakota, whose efforts in behalf of pure food legislation for several years have been gratefully rewarded at this session of congress, talked most interestingly to your correspondent today about the immense influence that oppose such legislation, and those which favor it.  
"By the construction given by the courts to the interstate commerce clause of the constitution," said Senator McCumber, "no state has the power to prevent any commercial article from being imported into its territory. Not only that; it has no right to interfere with the first sale of such property within its borders in original, unbroken packages. You can see, therefore, that state authorities are helpless so far as preventing importation and original sales. Now, it happens that about 95 per cent of all the adulterated and misbranded articles of commerce sold in states other than those in which they are manufactured.

"I have for years pressed consideration of a pure food bill. The present bill is to supplement the efforts of the states to eradicate the curse of adulterated and misbranded foods, to reach the root of the evil, the manufacturers themselves. Its object is also to protect the honest manufacturer and dealer. It is impossible for an honest manufacturer of goods to compete with one who manufactures counterfeit articles at one-tenth the cost. Another object is to prevent the evils of adverse laws of the several states and also adverse rulings by the commissioners of each state upon similar laws. A manufacturer sells to the wholesaler, who in turn wholesales trade ships products to all of the states. These products must be branded differently in different states. The wholesaler is at a loss very often to understand what the state requirement is. The decision of the state commissioner is sometimes arbitrary, and not always exercised with entire justice. If we had a national law on the subject of adulterated and misbranded goods, that law would govern, and state laws would conform to the national law. Another object is to promulgate honesty and decency in the sale of food and drugs. The purchaser of any food or drug is entitled to get just what he pays for.

"The bill does not determine what a man shall eat or drink, or consume in any way. It only determines what shall be shipped from one state to another. It declares what shall be deemed to be adulterated or misbranded, and when a product is adulterated or misbranded, it prevents its being sold or shipped from one state to another, but simply requires that it be labeled so that the purchaser will know what he is purchasing.

### The Opposition to the Bill.

"Among those who might be regarded as the principal opponents are the blenders of whiskies and wines; that is, those blenders who substitute ingredients other than good whisky and wine. It is well known that a dozen kinds of wine will be drawn from the same cask, colored and flavored to imitate known brands and sold upon the market as such. This is also true of olive oils and many other things which might be named. Another class of people who are opposed to the bill are those manufacturers of jellies or preserved fruits, who use inferior materials for their coloring, and also salicylic acid and copper for preserving and coloring. Many of these are represented in what is called the National Association of Food Products.

"The distillers, so far as I know, favor this legislation. Their products, of course, must measure up to the standard required by our laws. And it is nothing more than common sense that they should not be compelled to compete with blends of the worst characters of whiskies, rain water, pruned juice, beading oils, and flavorings often used in what are called the blended whiskies, wines, etc.

### Those Who Favor the Bill.

"I believe that it is well established that the brewers of the United States almost universally manufacture a pure article of beer. Their association strongly supports a measure of this kind.

"It is not always the article which has had to battle hardest for its existence, which seeks to shelter itself. Perhaps no product has been more bitterly assailed by competitors than the pure baking powder. And yet the manufacturers of this product, confident of the purity of their powders, by resolution declared their hearty support of this measure.

"Among the opposers are a number of manufacturers of patent medicines. The druggists who sell patent medicines, or at least their organ, the National Druggists, have been very bitter against any pure food and drug legislation.

### Honest Food for Honest Money.

"The bill, in short, seeks to prevent counterfeiting in those articles essential to the health and happiness of the people—foods and drugs. It insists that so long as we are compelled to pay for trade honest wares, we should purchase, the manufacturer of those goods should be compelled to give us honest goods in return.

"The great wrong which has undoubtedly created some prejudice against a bill of this kind is the false supposition that the agricultural department, or some person or persons, should inspect and pass upon the question of what manufacturer's goods should be entitled to be sold. There is nothing of the kind in the bill. There are clean-cut definitions declaring what are adulterated and what are misbranded goods, and preventing interstate commerce in such goods. And no power but the court itself and a jury can pass upon the question of whether or not any product measures up to the requirement of the law. That requirement is simple. It is that when goods are adulterated by substituting one ingredient for another, the package shall so state. You can sell glucose for glucose, but not for honey. You can sell a combination of brown sugar, glucose and a little maple sugar, but you cannot sell it as pure maple syrup.

"We will undoubtedly get a vote on this measure in the senate during the winter months."

### MRS. ROE IS SAFE

Requisition Papers Will Not Be Issued for Woman's Return.

HELENA, MONT.—Governor Toole has decided to issue no requisition papers on the authorities for the return to this state of Mrs. Emma Roe and Smith Higgins, wanted at Helena on a charge of grand larceny. It being alleged that Mrs. Roe had taken \$2,000 of insurance money that belonged to her minor children. The governor held that the evidence was probably insufficient to secure a conviction, and for this reason he declined to put the state to the expense of securing her return.

### MARINETTE, WIS.—The directors of the Northern Chautauque have turned down the request of the Christian Scientists of Marinette that a special day be set aside for them at next summer's meeting. The directors took the ground that the Christian Scientists are a religious sect, and that therefore no special day could be set apart for them.
