

SAYS THE POLICE SHIELD OFFENDER

Indignant Father Fails to Secure Arrest of Man Who Injured Daughter.

Hudson, Wis., Jan. 29.—S. O. Quale, whose daughter, Miss Viola Quale, was painfully injured by a hoodlum at South Stillwater, while she was passing thru the village in a sleigh with a group of Hudson high school students, now charges that the police of South Stillwater are shielding the offender from justice.

In company with the sheriff of St. Croix county and a police officer, he went to South Stillwater to demand that the criminal be produced. They first called on the village mayor, who told them that the marshal knew who had thrown the stone and was only waiting for some one to swear out a warrant, when he would promptly arrest the guilty person.

This was encouraging, but when the three Hudson men began to search for the marshal, they discovered that he was a hard man to find. They inquired of residents where he was and were told that he had been on the streets only a few minutes prior to the arrival of the Hudson men.

Cannot Find Marshal.
They went to the marshal's house three different times and to all public places in the village in quest of him, but he had disappeared. They searched for him in vain for three hours.

Quale therefore believes that the marshal and others in South Stillwater are trying to save the offending person from the consequences of his crime and popular indignation here is intensified. Quale and the Hudson authorities will not stop their efforts to find the criminal, and will not stop until he is apprehended. They will appeal to the sheriff of Washington county, and even to Governor Johnson if necessary.

The injury to Miss Quale's eye is even more serious than was at first supposed. The outside bone was badly bruised by the stone and it is feared she may lose the sight of that organ. Her father will take her to an eye specialist.

MITCHELL BECOMES GENERAL MANAGER

One of Steel Corporation's Principal Concerns Announces Several Promotions.

Duluth, Minn., Jan. 29.—With the return of Thomas F. Cole, president of the Oliver Mining company of the steel corporation, who has been in the east for some time, the annual meeting of the company was called. In the election of officers, no change in the official list was made, except the election of Pentecost Mitchell of Hibbing as general manager.

This office has been held by W. J. Oloft, who is also vice president of the Oliver property and president of the Duluth, Mesaba & Northern road. His duties were so many that it was decided to split up the work more, and when L. W. Powell resigned to go to Birmingham, Ala., Mitchell was selected for the position of general manager. He has been general superintendent of the Oliver properties in the Hibbing district. His place there has been filled by the appointment of William J. West, formerly assistant.

Promotion for McLean.
John H. McLean of Ironwood, Mich., who has been general superintendent of the Oliver property in the Gogebic range, has been appointed assistant general manager, the place made vacant by the retirement of Mr. Powell. With McLean's promotion, O. C. Davidson of Montpelier, Mich., who has been general superintendent of the Oliver properties on the Menominee range, becomes general superintendent of both the Menominee and Gogebic ranges.

D. E. Sutherland of Ironwood, Mich., is to be superintendent of the Gogebic range. It is understood that other promotions further down in the ranks of the company will be made, but it was decided today that the time was not ripe for an announcement.

WATERWORKS MAKES OFFER

Fergus Falls Concern Wants City to Buy Plant.

Fergus Falls, Minn., Jan. 29.—The Fergus Falls Waterworks company came forward with an offer to sell its plant, the price asked being \$98,000, which is exactly the amount of bonds voted at the city election held last summer. The bonds were voted for the purpose of buying or constructing a waterworks system.

Members of the waterworks committee had thought that about \$40,000 would be a fair price for the plant, and experts will be employed to place a valuation on it. The company contends that its earning capacity should be taken into consideration in fixing the price, while the city holds that its earnings are monopoly figures, and that the city should pay only the actual value of the labor and material that the plant represents.
