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RAILROADS GOT FORTY PER CENT

MAJOR HENRY A. NORTON IS CALLED BY DEATH

CAREER IS ENDED

SIXTH STREET TO HAVE NEW BLOCK

WARNER HARDWARE COMPANY WILL BUILD AT ONCE.

VACANT PROPERTY BETWEEN HENNEPIN AND NICOLLET, ACROSS ALLEY FROM ELKS' HALL BUILDING IS LEASED, AND FIVE-STORY FIREPROOF BUILDING OF REINFORCED CONCRETE AND BRICK WILL BE ERECTED.

NEGOTIATIONS HAVE JUST BEEN CLOSED BY THE WARNER HARDWARE COMPANY, 11 FOURTH STREET, FOR LEASE OF THE VACANT PROPERTY ON SIXTH STREET BETWEEN HENNEPIN AND NICOLLET AVENUES, ACROSS THE ALLEY FROM THE ELKS' HALL BUILDING. THE PROPERTY HAS A FRONTAGE OF 52 FEET ON SIXTH STREET AND A WIDTH OF 90 FEET IN THE REAR. ITS ALLEY FRONTAGE IS 157 FEET. THE LEASE IS MADE BY GEORGE R. LYMAN FOR 100 YEARS. WYVELL-HARRINGTON COMPANY ACTED AS AGENTS IN THE TRANSACTION. THE PROPERTY WILL BE IMPROVED IMMEDIATELY WITH A FIVE-STORY FIREPROOF BUILDING OF REINFORCED CONCRETE AND BRICK, COST ABOUT \$50,000. THE WARNER COMPANY HOPES TO OCCUPY THE BUILDING SEPT. 1. IT WAS FORCED TO MAKE THIS MOVE BY INCREASE IN ITS RETAIL AND WHOLESALE HARDWARE BUSINESS, AND LIMITATIONS OF SPACE IN THE FOUR-STORY BUILDING WHICH IT HAS OCCUPIED THE LAST FIVE YEARS.

R. L. WARNER, SENIOR MEMBER OF THE COMPANY AND ITS SECRETARY, STARTED IN THE HARDWARE BUSINESS ON THE EAST SIDE IN 1875 AND IS ONE OF THE OLDEST HARDWARE MEN IN THE CITY IN ACTIVE BUSINESS. HE HAS BEEN IN THE BUSINESS SINCE HE WAS 18. HE BECAME WARNER BROTHERS, AT FIFTH STREET AND CENTRAL AVENUE. IN 1895 F. R. WARNER MOVED TO BRIDGE SQUARE, WHERE HE HAS BEEN SINCE. HE WAS JOINED BY HIS BROTHERS, LEON C. WARNER, NOW PRESIDENT OF THE COMPANY, JOINED HIS FATHER IN 1895, AND HAS SINCE HIS DEATH CARRIED ON THE BUSINESS WITH HIS BROTHERS, R. L. WARNER, FORMING THE WARNER HARDWARE COMPANY IN 1901.

THE RAILROAD AND WAREHOUSE COMMISSION STATEMENT, SHOWING THAT \$5,215,150 HAS BEEN ISSUED BY THE STATE AND ITS SUBDIVISIONS TO AID RAILROAD BUILDING, CALLS ATTENTION TO THE LAND GRANT FEATURE. ALTHOUGH THE BOND ISSUES PROVIDED LARGE SUMS OF MONEY IN AID OF RAILROAD BUILDING, THEY WERE NOT AS INSIGNIFICANT IN COMPARISON TO THE VAST ESTATES OF LAND GIVEN TO THE RAILS.

MORE THAN 20,000,000 ACRES OF LAND IN MINNESOTA WENT TO THE RAILROADS. THE TOTAL LAND AREA OF THE STATE IS NOT QUITE 50,000,000 ACRES, SO THAT MORE THAN 40 PER CENT OF THE PUBLIC DOMAIN WAS HANDED OVER TO THE RAILROAD COMPANIES TO ENCOURAGE THEM IN CONSTRUCTION. THIS WAS MADE THE POOR LAND OF THE STATE, EITHER. THE CONGRESSIONAL GRANT OF 10,000,000 ACRES TO THE NORTH PACIFIC WAS ALMOST ALL PLACED ALONG THE LINE FROM DULUTH TO MOORHEAD, AND SOUTH OF THAT LINE. MOST OF THE OTHER GRANTS WERE SOUTH OF IT, AND THEREFORE, IN SOUTHERN MINNESOTA. THE DULUTH & IRON RANGE GRANT WAS IN ST. LOUIS COUNTY, BUT CONTAINED LANDS RICH IN TIMBER AND METALS. THE GREAT MINNESOTA GRANT INCLUDED A SLICE THRU THE RED RIVER VALLEY.

THE MAJORITY OF THE GRANTS WERE MADE BY CONGRESS. THE NORTHERN PACIFIC GRANT WAS MADE DIRECT, AND WAS GIVEN TO THE EXTENT OF 9,370,735 ACRES, ACCORDING TO THE BEST FIGURES OBTAINABLE. OTHER GRANTS WERE MADE BY CONGRESS TO THE STATE TO CONVEY TO THE RAILROADS. THESE GRANTS WERE FILLED AS FOLLOWS:

State Swamp Land Grants.

Then the state made large grants of swamp lands which had come to it thru the congressional grant of 1860. The lands remaining have been made to yield large returns for the state school fund and state institutions. Only one of these grants, that to the Minneapolis & St. Cloud, has ever been canceled. The rest have been practically filled, as follows:
