Liverpool cables: "Wheat firm with a better demand. Argentine shipments are more moderate than anticipated, corn facturing, tendency upward. Consumption has increased on account of the low cost."

The Modern Miller says: "Winter wheat crop in a large area has been protected from prevailing wintry conditions by a covering of snow. Kansas and Nebraska had little or no snow and a lack of moisture in these states is complained of. The southwest reports apprehension of damage where the plant was unseasonably advanced in growth and what is shelled from corn, as damage can hardly be revealed before the growing weather is experienced."
