**BERNARD DEMES 'LOBBY' CHARGES**

Blames Hitchcock of Crookston for Attacks as to Drainage League.

Washington, Feb. 15.—"Attacks on me and Mr. Hays for maintaining a so-called lobby at Washington are all due to hard feeling entertained by Mr. Hitchcock, former editor of the Bemidji Pioneer, and now in temporary charge of the Crookston Times, in the absence of its editor," said A. G. Bernard, president of the state drainage league, today.

"Hitchcock is trying to hit Hays over my shoulders, because of an investigation of county printing for which he had the contract, which investigation was made by direction of Governor Johnson.

"The charge is made that a fund of \$3,000 has been raised to pay the expenses of myself and Mr. Hays here. In the first place, Hays isn't here and hasn't been here this winter. In the second place, the total of the cash contributions to the league is \$400, given by the Minneapolis Chamber of Commerce. Help has been promised from other sources, but has not yet been received. The league has not had any individual contributions from business men in the two cities. One Duluth commercial organization voted to subscribe \$1,000, but afterward reconsidered the vote and the money was never contributed.

"The money which has been contributed and has been expended in the preparation of maps, in soil analysis, in traveling expenses around the state, and, partly, for my trip to Washington, was made at the suggestion of members of the Minnesota Chamber of Commerce who wanted information on the subject and didn't have time to go into it thoroughly themselves.

"Outcry is made because we didn't go into the subject part of the state there, instead of taking up the subject in Washington. The time hasn't come for that. We will open that campaign in the fall, during the political campaign, when people are talking of electing members of the legislature. That body doesn't meet until next year, and anything done now would be fruitless, because the subject would be forgotten during the summer. We want our matters to be fresh in the public mind when the legislature meets.

"I shall give a full account of all contributions at the next meeting of the league at Wadena, next summer."

**DANISH CAPITAL MOURNS ITS DEAD**

Copenhagen in Grief at Departure of King Christian's Remains for Roskilde.

Copenhagen, Feb. 15.—The body of King Christian was removed from the Christianborg church here today to the cathedral at Roskilde, where it will be buried Sunday among the tombs of the Danish kings, who for a thousand years have found their resting place in the ancient capital of the kingdom.

The whole of Copenhagen was given up to mourning. Business and work were at a standstill, while emblems of sorrow were displayed everywhere. The enormous crowds of town people, garbed in black, swelled by thousands of arrivals from the country districts, thronged the square in front of the Christianborg church, reaching the route thence to the railway station from early morning standing patiently for hours in order to pay a last tribute to the dead monarch.

The windows all along the route were filled with spectators who paid high prices for seats. Most of the owners of such places of vantage announced their intention of donating the charity, in the name of King Christian, the proceeds of the sale of seats.

Shortly before noon the kings of Denmark and Norway, Queen Alexandra, the dowager empress of Russia and other royal relatives of the deceased, and the representatives of foreign sovereigns, gathered at the Christianborg church, where a brief service was held, at the conclusion of which the coffin, covered with the Danish standard, was borne high by naval and military officers to the waiting hearse.

Then, headed by infantry and cavalry, a simple cortege was formed and slowly proceeded thru the streets three and a half miles to the railway station, and the railroad station. Immediately behind the hearse was led King Christian's favorite riding horse, Jussur, which will be shot tonight according to the ancient Danish custom. The procession was closed with carriages bearing the male members of royal families represented at the funeral, the ladies watching the departure of the body from a neighboring building.

The bells of all the churches were rung in honor of the deceased, and the arsenal throughout the progress of the cortege and until the coffin was placed on the funeral train.

For the first time in history that the body of Danish king had been transferred by railroad to the burial place. At the time of the death of Frederick VII, the predecessor of King Christian, in 1893, the use of a railroad train for the conveyance of the king's body to Roskilde was not considered sufficiently dignified.

During the progress of the railroad station the cortege was swelled by the veteran and similar military associations and the students and other societies which were present at the rear of the procession.

Many affecting scenes were witnessed in the streets. The profound silence was broken only by the sobs of the women and the momentary excitement caused by fainting and minor accidents due to the pressure of the huge crowd.

On arrival at the station the coffin was again lifted by naval and military officers and placed in the funeral car, in which some of the royal family also traveled. On reaching Roskilde, the Fouring regiments formed the escort of the coffin, which was borne to the cathedral and placed on a catafalque before the high altar to await the last rites on Sunday.

**FINDS GOLD MINE IN AN OLD WELL**

Farmer Near River Falls, Wis., Discovers Riches on His Property.

River Falls, Wis., Feb. 15.—As the result of a discovery of what seems to be gold-bearing sands in an old well, the offer of a third of a million dollars for a farm that sold for \$1,200 two years ago has been made to a retired farmer of River Falls.

The farm on which the discovery was made is a mile north of the town and is well known throughout the region as the "old Guy place." It contains 225 acres, and three years ago Mrs. C. V. Guy sold it to Greenleaf Doe for a consideration of \$600 an acre.

Doe, now a retired farmer living here, was with the help of a hired man, cleaning out an abandoned well on Monday. The task was a disagreeable one, as the curbing that had been in place a quarter of a century was badly rotten in many places.

Children Discovered Gold.

While overhauling the tub at a depth of 135 feet, a sudden geyser of water from one of the sides caused the two men to make a hurried retreat. The water of the assistant at the top, and it was some hours before they ventured down again. The slide displaced several wagon loads of dirt. This was taken out with the assistance of a windlass, and while replacing the defective curbing, which had been the cause of the mishap, a second fall of earth occurred, disarranging them in their efforts to reclaim the well. Doe had given orders to fence in the hole and have it filled in the spring in order to guard against accidents, but on the following day children of the tenant spied the sand, and a panful of it was carried to the house. The large quantity of golden grains were then taken to his farm. Some of these were washed out, and upon being assayed were found to be gold.

Excitement Grows Intense.

Another visit was then made to the bottom of the well, and many more glittering particles were found. The news spread rapidly, and yesterday Doe was offered \$1,500 an acre for his farm. He refuses to accept any offer for the present.

The excitement has become intense and every farmer in the vicinity is assessing an open well is investigating. Others will do so as soon as the frost is out sufficiently to permit of surface prospecting. The search has been carried on so relentlessly that many wells are being rendered temporarily useless, and the owners are going to the river for stock water.

The geological formation at the place of the discovery is similar to that covering an area of about fifteen square miles about River Falls, and aside from this tract nothing similar is found in the state of Wisconsin. Bluffs of a peculiar quality of sandstone are the prevailing characteristic. The working of glaciers has left these standing in strange convolutions which rise to the height of several hundred feet above the surrounding country. It is confidently predicted that the gold-bearing stratum will be found to be built on gold-bearing sand.

**TAXES DOUBLED**

Soo System Will Contribute \$152,138 to State Revenues.

Soo line taxes to the state for last year are more than doubled. Gross earnings showed \$3,802,460.65, while in 1904 they were \$2,519,871.68. The taxes will be \$152,138.67, as compared with only \$75,596.15 the year before. The St. Louis earnings showing was an increase from \$2,405,995.36 to \$2,456,979.53. The Iowa Central reported gross earnings in Minnesota for 1905 as \$39,886.11, the Burlington, \$298,400.23 and the Duluth, South Shore & Atlantic at \$2,792.84.

**Soo Will Change Line.**

Starkweather, N. D., Feb. 15.—It is reported that the Soo line will, early in the spring, tear up its line from England to Armourdale in the Powder country and will then build in a northerly direction from England to Searles, Cavalier county.

**RAILROAD NOTES.**

Deadlock still exists in the meeting of railway lines to consider the passenger differential in the West. At present, the representatives, which has continued three days in Chicago, the Grand Trunk, Michigan Central and Erie, will not be able to agree.

All St. Paul general offices of the Great Western road, except the passenger department, are being moved to the Metropolitan and adjoining buildings. The passenger department will make the change in about one month.

**TRAIN KILLS GIRL AND FATALLY HURTS MOTHER**

Ames, Iowa, Feb. 15.—Miss Sadie White, 18 years of age, was instantly killed and her mother, Mrs. J. T. White, was probably fatally hurt last night when the carriage in which they were returning from church was run down by a fast North-Western train.

Mrs. White was thrown 100 feet and seriously injured. Her oldest daughter was carried a mile and a half on the pilot of the engine and terribly mangled. A younger daughter, Hazel, escaped practically unharmed.

The husband and father is away on a business trip and cannot be found.
