## STUDENTS TO AIR FOOTBALL VIEWS

### INSURGENTS PROMISE EXCITEMENT IN 'U' MASS MEETING.

Attempt May Be Made to Show Dissatisfaction in Faculty's Indorsement of Big Nine Recommendations, Through Resolutions—Students Allege Printers' Combine Exists in Minneapolis.

Arrangements are complete for the football mass meeting to be held at the university tomorrow afternoon and students who have been sizing up undergraduate sentiment in regard to the big nine conference recommendations look for a rather spirited undergraduate session.

An attempt will probably be made to pass resolutions expressing the dissatisfaction of the students with the action of the Minnesota council in adopting the big nine recommendations and as faculty members and probably students will be present to defend the council no unanimous action on the part of the undergraduates is expected.

John Gleason, president of the university athletic board and a strong football enthusiast, will preside at the meeting and faculty members and students will express their views in regard to Minnesota's attitude. If the majority of the students present are in favor of letting the action of the faculty go without a protest there will be no action taken, but if the insurgent element prevail, interesting resolutions will be passed by the undergraduates.

Claiming that Minneapolis printing firms have formed a combination, and that a fair estimate for printing and university junior annual cannot be obtained in Minneapolis, students on the 1907 Gopher board have asked for bids in other cities.

At a meeting held at the university tonight a Chicago firm probably will be awarded the Gopher contract.

The 1907 Gopher is to be published next spring, and the manuscript connected with the printing of last year's book, and the refusal of the senior class to assume an indebtedness due a Minneapolis printing firm for the 1906 annual, has been a great deal of interest in university circles as to what firm would print the 1907 Gopher.

In the past a Minneapolis firm has invariably been awarded the contract and the announcement that the Gopher managers contemplate having the work done in Chicago has created comment on the campus.

According to members of the Gopher board the bids for the Minneapolis firm were almost identical, with one exception. The work can be done in Chicago for about half the amount asked by the lowest Minneapolis bidder.

## ITASCA CO. PETITIONS BOTH FOUND REGULAR

The two petitions on file calling for division of Itasca county were approved today as to their form, by the proper state officers.

When it comes to issuing the proclamation for a special election, the governor must act alone, on the attorney general's advice. The law provides that only one proposition may be voted on at any election. C. W. Stanton, who filed the Koochiching county petition, Jan. 25, claims that this petition has precedence and shuts out all others.

A. A. Tone, representing the Ripple and the Forest county petition, also present today, and will argue against the validity of the law. Deer River and Northome, which villages are both ambitious to be county seats, also circulating petitions and will file them later.

## TO BANISH NIGHT FROM BIG ISLAND

AMUSEMENT PARK THERE WILL BLAZE WITH LIGHT.

Current Will Be Conducted to Minneapolis from the Minneapolis Generating Station Over a Pole Line Now Being Constructed—Building to Be Encrusted with Incandescent Bulbs.

Old Sol will be able to fold up his kit and go out of business, night or day, next summer, so far as the street railway company's white city on Big Island, Lake Minnetonka, will be concerned. He will be able to sink in the west at night without a care or worry about being missed. Even if he should decide to go into eclipse for a week at a time, the result would be as bright as day.

The brilliant lighting scheme of "The Great White Way," which is the route of the trolley line from Harriet to Excelsior and Deephaven, will be carried out on the island, also. Every nook and corner of the sixty-acre tract which is to be turned into a wonderful pleasure resort, will be brilliantly lighted with powerful electric lights. Night will be as bright as day.

In addition to the hundreds of are lights scattered thru the trees of the picnic grounds and along the wharves and promenades, the beautiful pavilion and amusement buildings will be encrusted with thousands of incandescent lights that will add their share to the brilliancy of the scene. Viewed from the water, the island city will be a veritable fairyland of light and shadow. The beauty will be further enhanced by the brilliantly lighted ferris wheel boats that will glide in and out of the port of the white city.

The current that will make the island bright as day even in the darkest of winter, will come from the Minneapolis powerhouse of the company. The task of arranging its transmission to the lake and to the island will be no small one. Beginning at Hopkins, the transmission line branches from the trolley right of way toward the lake. The terminal of the pole line, between Lincoln and Summerville, which offers the shortest stretch of water between the mainland and the island. An armored submarine cable will be laid on the bottom carrying the "juice" to the shore station on the island.

The transmission line will carry an alternating current of 3,500 volts. At the present station on the island will reduce it to the voltage required on the lighting system. The power thus transmitted and used for lighting will be generated by a dynamo between 700 and 800 horsepower. Work has already been started on the pole line.
