

BABY'S MILLIONS MOUNTING FAST

John Nicholas Brown Breaks all Records as Quiet Accumulator of Wealth.

Providence, R. I., Feb. 23.—John D. Rockefeller may hold the bulk record as a pile-up of millions. "Uncle" Russell Sage may hold the record in the same class for closeness and Andrew Carnegie possibly has locked up somewhere a certificate as to his possession of the generosity record, but John Nicholas Brown has broken all speed records.

For John Nicholas Brown on his sixth birthday is the possessor of \$11,000,000, \$6,000,000 of which was added to his fortune by this precocious child since he was three months old.

And the hardest work little John Nicholas Brown did for this \$7,000,000 was to take his bottle regularly and industriously and to romp about the nursery.

If John Nicholas Brown, who was left \$4,000,000 by his father, John Nicholas Brown, when he was 3 months old, continues to amass riches as he has done in the last five years and nine months when he is 21, will be one of the richest men of the country. He will be worth \$50,000,000. At the age of 2 years Baby Brown had already increased his little legacy to \$5,182,000.

Yet Baby Brown is a royal spender. He employs a small army of servants, maintains an establishment at Newport and another in New York, and so manages to get rid of \$50,000 a year. Still his money keeps on piling up, notwithstanding his lavish expenditures.

At the age of 4 his \$4,000,000 had grown to \$6,474,000 and on his sixth birthday yesterday he had the modest sum of \$10,999,000 in gilt-edged securities.

wide specifically for court review. But if this review is to be provided for, they want it to be in language which they themselves can understand and being harmful to the bill as it passed the house.

It is the president's desire to prevent the courts from retrying any rate cases. He would have them simply review the legality of the order and decide whether that order had run counter to the constitution. Specific review language in the act itself, he thinks, might indicate to the courts that it was the desire of congress not to have any rate case retried. But at the same time he knows full well, as does every lawyer, that the courts have the final word on every law congress may pass, and that nothing congress may enact can either extend or limit judicial authority.

Congress and Court.
If it is to be the policy of the courts to retry rate cases and to hold that the word "unreasonable" means "confiscation" in law as applied to rates, nothing congress can put into the rate law will alter that situation.

The courts have in the final word. The most that can be done by congress is to frame up a law that will be most likely to harmonize with what seems to be the trend of court decisions; trusting to luck for what will happen when the courts come to pass upon that law. It is this that the president has been doing in the present instance.

JOKER IN KNOX BILL
Railroads Would Be Able to Delay Court Review.

Chicago, Feb. 23.—Regarding the Knox rate bill the Chicago Tribune's Washington correspondent says, in part:

There are some cunning things in section 5 of the Knox bill. It could scarcely have been accidental that the distinguished Pennsylvania senator introduced the provision that in case of complaint against the finding of the interstate commerce commission, the railroad interested could bring its suit for review before any circuit court along the entire line of its road. The shipper making complaint has but a single trial to make his case, and the interstate commerce commission, present his testimony and seek to have the "unreasonable" rates changed into a reasonable one.

The Review Provision.
The review provision is as follows: "Section 5, that the orders of the commission, except orders for the payment of money, shall take effect within such reasonable time as shall be prescribed by the commission and shall continue for such period of time, not exceeding two years, as shall be prescribed in the order of the commission unless sooner set aside by the commission or suspended, or set aside by order of a court in suit to test the lawfulness of such order, but any carrier, person or corporation party to the proceedings affected by the decision of the commission as to the rate or practice covered by the complaint or by its order prescribing a different rate or practice and alleging either or both to be a violation of its or his rights may institute proceedings against the complainant and the interstate commerce commission in the circuit court of the United States for the district in which any portion of the carrier or carriers that were parties to the complaint may be located, sitting as a court of equity, to have such questions determined, but in no other way shall the lawfulness of such order be questioned, and in all such proceedings the court shall have power to order the appearance of the parties from any part of the United States and the existing laws relative to evidence and to proceedings under the acts to regulate commerce shall be applicable. Provided, however, that no order of the commission reducing a rate shall be set aside or suspended by an interlocutory decree of the court without requiring a deposit of excess charge or sufficient



board to secure the parties entitled thereto the repayment, if the commission's order is sustained, of all moneys received by the carrier in excess of the rate fixed by the commission, and the court shall determine in such interlocutory decree what practices shall be pursued by the parties pending the litigation in order to make this right of repayment certain and effective.

Intent Is Obvious.
The intention of this paragraph is obvious. For instance, if a wholesale grocer in Chicago should ship a carload of flour to Valparaiso, Ind., he would have to pay the rate fixed by the Pennsylvania railroad, without consultation with him. He might find it extremely burdensome and would thereupon appeal to the interstate commerce commission. That tribunal, when it had the time, would take testimony to find out whether the rate was just or unjust. It might reduce it materially, but the shipper would pay the rate just the same, because the railroads would have immediate right of appeal to the courts.

Would that appeal be heard in Chicago, where the shipper lives and where he had some friends? Not if the Pennsylvania railroad knew itself. It is a great corporation, running not only from New York to Chicago, but to Louisville, Indianapolis, St. Louis, Washington and other points, away from the main stem. The great Pennsylvania trunk line covers thousands and thousands of miles of territory. Under the Knox amendment, which

Boston, Feb. 23.—Wilhelm Gericke has resigned as conductor of the Boston Symphony orchestra, his resignation to take effect at the end of the present season. Major Higginson did not approve them and Mr. Gericke declined the offer. He says he will return to Europe. Mr. Gericke was conductor of the Symphony orchestra from 1884 to 1889 and from 1898 until the present time.
