Hastings takes a higher rate than Afton, on the Stillwater line, and as coal from Duluth to Afton has been taken by way of Hastings, this was urged to be a violation of the long-haul-and-short-haul clause.

### BOYS EAGER FOR CADET REGIMENT

FIRST DAY'S ENROLLMENT FAR OVER ONE HUNDRED.

First Recruits Had a Chance to Drill with the St. Marks Brigade Last Night—Recruiting Office Will Be Open from 4 to 6 p. m. Every Day.

Within two hours of the time the recruiting office of the Journal Cadet regiment opened at 4 p. m. yesterday, 140 boys signed the enlistment roll. Today the recruiting office will be transferred to the floor above Hoffman's Toggery shop, adjoining the Journal building, and Captain Sprague will be on hand after noon to receive recruits. It is required that a boy must have the consent of either parents or guardians before he can join. Boys who desire to join should make out this application and bring it with them:



While this week must necessarily be given up to the preliminary work of enlisting the boys, it is proposed to have the drills begin as soon as possible. Last night a number of the new recruits were allowed to drill with the St. Mark's church boys' brigade, and received their first lesson in the school of the soldier.

By the close of the week the number of boys enlisted will probably be sufficiently large so that the division into companies will be made. This will be done according to residential location for the convenience of the boys so their drills will be near their homes. The drills will begin at 7:30 p. m. and will last about an hour. They will be held once a week.

## TAKES ISSUE WITH ROOT

REV. H. S. JOHNSON DECLARES IT IS UP TO UNITED STATES TO INTERFERE IN CONGO.

"I do not consider myself lawyer enough to take issue with Secretary Root in regard to our right to interfere in the Congo matter," said Rev. H. S. Johnson of Boston to The Journal, "but I will say that the Congo Reform association is acting under expert advice of men in the government who are as good lawyers as Secretary Root. They declare there is no law in the right of this country to interfere.

"The United States is more responsible than any other country for the presence of Leopold II in the Congo country. It was this country which gave his sovereignty its start by recognizing his claim. At that time England was negotiating a treaty by which Portugal would have been entrusted with the administration of the new state, but when this country took such advanced ground for Leopold, England withdrew her attempt at independent action.

## MAY FORM A MEN'S CLUB

ORGANIZATION TO STAND FOR RIGHT PROJECTED IN WESTMINSTER CHURCH.

Formation of a men's club is under discussion at Westminster church. A mass meeting of the men will be held at the organization of a club for literary, social and religious work will be considered. The matter was presented last night at the meeting of the Westminster club, with Frank B. Daniels, Kenwood boulevard, and the indorsement of the club was asked. Westminster church has never had a men's club, also it is one of the foremost churches in the denomination in all other branches of church and missionary work. The membership of the church is about 1,800, and the congregation still larger. With this material to draw upon it is believed that an organization of the men would become one of the leading associations for good in the nation.
