

INSURANCE BEYOND FEDERAL CONTROL

Neither Fire Nor Life Risks Are Interstate Commerce, Say House Lawyers.

Special to the Journal. Chicago, March 6.—A Washington special to the Chicago Tribune says: Neither fire nor life insurance business is interstate commerce within the meaning of the constitution.

This is the view of an overwhelming majority of the judiciary committee of the house, to which the question was referred as to the power of congress to regulate the insurance companies. A report to this effect will be prepared soon.

An informal canvass of the committee has shown that practically all the members, republicans and democrats, are inclined to the belief that under the decisions of the supreme court of the United States the business of life insurance cannot be considered in the light of actual commerce between the states.

No Specific Power.

This means that congress has no specific power to regulate insurance companies and the campaign in that direction will have to be dropped because of the house of representatives scarcely would pass a bill which its own committee on judiciary, the highest legal authority it can appeal to, has pronounced in advance to be unconstitutional.

This decision of the house committee is pretty much what has been expected. Aside from the legal questions involved, individual members of the house and senate have been extremely susceptible of the whole propaganda for federal regulation of life insurance companies.

Dryden as Sponsor.

The principal sponsor for the entire idea and the author of two or three bills on the subject has been Senator Dryden of New Jersey. He is an estimable gentleman, whose personal motives are not a matter of criticism in any sense, and he has been president of the Prudential Insurance company.

According to the records of congress, the movement for federal control of life insurance companies always has been fostered by the New York insurance companies themselves. It was first proposed seriously by Mr. Pattison, now governor of Ohio, who was then, as he is now, president of the American and well-conducted life insurance company in Cincinnati. Mr. Pattison failed to make any impression on congress and the movement was dropped entirely until Senator Dryden, another insurance president, renewed the attempt. Now the judiciary committee of the house is about to sit down on the whole scheme from a purely legal standpoint, and before long will administer a black eye to the project of unadulterated government regulation of insurance companies.

As to Campaign Funds.

Washington, March 6.—Officials of the New York insurance companies are to appear before a committee on the committee on election of president, vice president and members of congress exactly what contributions have been made to campaign funds. Not only are the life insurance companies to be called and made to testify under oath, but Charles E. Hughes, the inquisitor in the insurance investigation in New York city, will be asked to appear before the committee and give what information he has secured, as well as his views on the subject. Those who have been conducting the investigation, the Armstrong committee and others identified with it, will be asked to appear and testify, and will be ordered to bring with them all papers, documents and records which have any bearing on the subject of political campaign contributions.

SEEKING LOBBYIST'S WEALTH

New York Life Would Like to Recover Thousands.

New York, March 6.—Agents and detectives in the employ of the legal department of the New York Life insurance company are trying to discover where "Andy" Hamilton's wealth is hidden.

The company has claims against Hamilton amounting to more than \$450,000, and this sum may be swelled to \$800,000. The papers in several suits against Hamilton for restitution are being forwarded. The company, to insure the recovery of at least a part of the funds, in event of judgment being rendered in its favor, wants it to be in a position to levy attachments upon whatever it can find belonging to the missing legislative agent.

It has been discovered that Hamilton has several large speculative accounts which are still open upon the books of certain Wall street firms. These show that Hamilton was somewhat of a plunger in the stock market.

Light on Lobbying.

These speculative accounts, it is thought, may throw interesting light upon the methods of the legislative agents of the large insurance companies and also make trouble for certain legislators or former legislators.

One of the recognized ways for the payment of legislators for services rendered is to carry stocks on margin for them. Whether Hamilton ever liquidated any of the legislative debts of the New York city way is not known by anyone now connected with the company, but it is the purpose,

Promised to Return.

New York, March 6.—It became known today that James H. Hyde, formerly vice president of the Equitable Life Assurance society, as well as Richard A. McCurdy, former president of the Mutual Life Insurance company, before sailing for Europe, some time ago made a written promise to District Attorney Jerome to return to this country any time his presence is desired.

The trustees of the New York Life Insurance company have authorized the president to employ counsel, if he shall see fit, to oppose passage in the legislature of certain recommendations of the legislative investigating committees. The trustees did not state specifically which regulations were objectionable, and declared that they believed some provisions of the insurance committee to be salutary.

Legislation in Ohio.

Columbus, Ohio, March 6.—Fourteen bills regulating insurance companies doing business in Ohio have been introduced in the house by Representative Stewart of Clark county. The bills cover the most important recommendations of the Armstrong committee and are drawn in close conformity to the bills recommended by that committee to the New York legislature.

\$1,000 LICENSE FOR SALOONS IN CHICAGO

Chicago, March 6.—By a vote of 40 to 22, the city council last night adopted the ordinance fixing the saloon license at \$1,000 a year. When the vote was announced Mayor Dunne said:

"I shall sign the ordinance just as soon as it is presented to me. It is as good as a law right now."

This vote of the council adds \$3,500,000 to the annual revenue of the city and insures the increase in the police force of 1,000 new Chicago Police.

Police Collins says he will now suppress Chicago's crime. Six aldermen who were either committed to the low license cause or had voted for the low figure at the former meeting stepped over the line at the last moment and registered their vote with the high license faction. Four votes more than enough were cast for high license.

PRESIDENT TO PASS ON FOREST RESERVE LINES

Washington, March 6.—Representatives Buckman and Bede have determined to take the question of changing the boundaries of the Minnesota forest reserve to the national black eye to the president with Bede's approval and support, on Saturday laid before Gifford Pinchot, chief of the forest service, a proposition to release about one-third of the reserve and to take the land east of Leech Lake in place of it, or to extend the reserve southward to include land around Walker.

Pinchot said he had around Walker already is disposed of, and he was opposed to extending the eastern boundary of the reserve further eastward. In order to ascertain the sentiment of the president, and before introducing a bill covering their ideas of what should be done, Buckman and Bede will see Mr. Roosevelt at the earliest opportunity.

CONFESSION CLEARS DISAPPEARANCE CASE

Boise, Idaho, March 6.—It has been learned that the confession of Steve Adams clears up the mystery surrounding the disappearance of two of the men who were killed during the troubles at Telluride in 1902. One case is that of J. W. Barney, foreman of the Smuggler Union mine, the other that of J. Wesley Smith. Both men disappeared mysteriously. Barney was taken from a livery stable by a lot of men and was not seen again. Smith was preparing to go to Colorado Springs to visit his family. He disappeared from the hotel. He formerly worked on the Bunker Hill and Sullivan mine at Wardner. Smith was a non-union man. What Adams told about the disappearance of the men is not known.

FREMSTAD TRIUMPH IN ROLE OF CARMEN

New York, March 6.—Bizez's Carmen, presented for the first time this season with Olive Fremstad in the title role and Caruso as Don Jose, attracted a more than ordinarily brilliant assembly of the metropolitan opera house last night. Miss Fremstad achieved a triumph in her portrayal of the witcheries of the fickle gypsy and Caruso's Don Jose, from his first meeting with the enchantress to the final scene in which he wreaks his vengeance on her, was greeted with applause. Bessie Abbott as Micaela, Journet as Escamillo and Dufriehe as Doncairo shared the success of the evening with the others.

ACTRESS PREVENTS PANIC IN THEATER

Logansport, Ind., March 6.—While the play, "When Knighthood Was in Flower" was in progress at Dowling's theater last night, fire in an adjoining building filled the playhouse with smoke and created a panic in the audience.

Only the presence of mind of Roselle Knott, the leading woman, prevented a stampede. She stepped to the footlights and in clear distinct tones announced that there was no danger as the fire was a small one in an adjoining building. When the curtain dropped during the second act it was announced from the stage that the play would be resumed in an hour, but the audience fled out of the theater. The fire was soon extinguished.

MAJOR HOPKINS DEAD

Distinguished G. A. R. Man of Michigan Is Stricken.

Detroit, Mich., March 6.—Major General H. Hopkins, former department commander of the G. A. R., department of Michigan, who held an important confidential position in the war department under Secretary Alger during the Spanish-American war, died today. Major Hopkins was 64 years of age. He was a veteran of the civil war, was four years private secretary to the late Governor John J. Ingley, was chairman of the state republican committee for several years and was a member of the state house of representatives from 1879 to 1883.

PRESIDENT URGES SEACOAST DEFENSE

Washington, March 6.—President Roosevelt, in a special message, urges upon congress the necessity for more elaborate seacoast defenses. He asks for increased appropriations, but does not name any specific sum. He names a number of points along the American coast, in the Philippines, Guam, Guantanamo, Porto Rico and Hawaii, where extensive additions to the defenses should be made. He uses the Russian-Japanese war as an object lesson, saying the Japanese home ports were so well fortified that the navy was left entirely free to pursue the aggressive. The president's message, which was sent in late yesterday, was based on the report submitted by the Endicott board, which has been studying the situation and preparing a comprehensive plan of seacoast defenses for the United States and its insular possessions. This report was transmitted to congress with a letter on the subject from Secretary Taft.
