CO. L MUSTERS FOR CADET REGIMENT

GROWN FOLKS CHEER BOYS IN FIRST DRILL

Brigades Organized Prior to Journal's Army May Become Part of Regiment as Bodies by Complying with Conditions—More Recruits Sign for Grand Army Campaign.

The boys assigned to Company F in Sunday's Journal, drill tonight at 8 o'clock at the meeting for the formation of Company L of the Journal Cadet Regiment. The hall is too small for such a large number, and the company was divided into three squads for the present. The older boys will drill Tuesday evenings and the other squads at 4 o'clock Friday and Saturday afternoons each week. Considering the circumstances, a good start was made.

Inquiry has been made by a number of boys' brigades that were organized before the inception of the Journal regiment as to whether they can join and maintain their organization as it is now. This will be allowed, provided the boys accept the conditions as to procuring uniforms. DRILL LESSON II.

Salute with the Hand.

At the command, salute, raise the right hand and smartly tilt the tip of the forehead touches the lower part of the head dress (if uncovered, the forehead) above the right eye, thumb and forefinger extended and joined, palm to the left, forearm inclined at about forty-five degrees, hand and wrist straight. At the command two, drop the hand smartly to the side. The salute for officers is the same as for privates, but the left hand is used only when the right hand is engaged. Officers and men when saluting will look toward the person saluted.

Steps and Marching

The Salute. The length of the step is thirty inches, measured from heel to heel, and the cadence is at the rate of 120 steps a minute. Commands: Forward, march.

At the command forward, throw the weight of the body upon the right leg, left leg straight.

At the command march, move the left leg smartly, but without jerk, straight forward thirty inches from the right, measuring from heel to heel, sole near the ground; straighten and turn the knee slightly out; at the same time throw the weight of the body forward, and plant the foot without shock, weight of body resting upon it; next in like manner advance the right foot and plant it as above; continue the march.

The cadence is at first given slowly and gradually increased to quick time. The arms hang naturally, the hands moving about six inches to the front and three inches to the rear of the seam of the trousers. Double Time. The length of the full step in double time is thirty-six inches; the cadence is at the rate of 180 steps per minute. Command: Forward, double time, march.

At the command forward, throw the weight of the body on the right leg. At the command march, raise the hands until the forearms are horizontal, fingers closed, nails toward the body, elbows to the rear; carry forward the left foot, knee slightly bent and somewhat raised, and plant the foot thirty-six inches from the right; then execute the same motion with the right foot; continue this alternate movement of the feet, throwing the weight of the body forward and allowing a natural swinging motion to the arms.

If marching in quick time, the command forward is omitted. At the command march, given as either foot strikes the ground, take one step in quick and then step off in double time.
