North Dakota Senator Introduces New Measure, on Two-State Plan.

Washington, March 8.—Senator McCumber of North Dakota today introduced a substitute for the statehood bill, creating one state of Oklahoma and another of Indian Territory.

He predicted in the near future the west would have a much larger population than the east, and said that even the present boundary lines were served it would still be impossible to secure as many states as there were east of the Mississippi.

BROWN TO QUIT SUPREME BENCH

President Roosevelt Offers the Place to Senator Knox, Who Declines.

Washington, March 8.—Associate Justice Henry Billings Brown of the United States supreme court intends to retire from the bench, and has notified President Roosevelt.

Justice Brown was 70 years old on March 7. Having reached that age and served ten years as a member of the supreme court, he was privileged to retire on full pay.
