All night she sat by his side administering antidotes, thus undoubtedly saving his life. In the morning he was able to get up, and the doctor, who went for a doctor. Hanson is still suffering from the effects of the poison, but danger of his life is thought to be past.

KILLED ON WEDDING EVE

MONTANA MONTANA SETTLERS SEND A PROTEST TO WASHINGTON

Great Falls, Mont., March 9.—Vigorous protests have been sent by residents of Valley county to the secretary of the interior, the commissioner of the general land office and the Indian commissioner against the allotment of some 80,000 acres of valuable lands in that county to Indians from North Dakota. The lands allotted will be exempt from taxation and the Indians will be prohibited from leasing them.

Plan to Give North Dakota Redmen 80,000 Acres in Valley County Arouses Indignation of Homesteaders, Who Claim State's Prospects Will Be Permanently Injured and Land Will Depreciate.

The tribes to whom it is proposed to allot the land are those known as the Turtle Mountain Indians. Their reservation in North Dakota was recently ceded to the government, and it was at first planned to give them other lands in the same locality. The people living there, however, protested against the government's plan, and the Indian department transferred the land to Valley county, Montana, giving to each head of a family 160 acres for himself and eight acres for each child.
