

WOMAN IN TRANCE
RECOVERS ON BIER

Mrs. W. R. Sherwood of Mabel, Minn., Narrowly Escapes Being Buried Alive.

Special to The Journal. La Crosse, Wis., March 10.—By waking from a deathlike trance in the nick of time, Mrs. W. R. Sherwood, a bride of a week, and 25 years of age, saved herself from being buried alive. She so frightened two women who were sitting up with her supposed corpse that their condition is serious.

Mrs. Sherwood lives at Mabel, Minn., apparently died of pneumonia at 8 o'clock in the afternoon. Her body was placed on a bier and an undertaker sent for.

Just before dawn two friends, sitting with the corpse, were startled by a wild shriek and, peering into the death chamber, found the corpse sitting up. She was delirious from having realized her harrowing position without being able to move. Mrs. Sherwood will recover.

Indian Chief Buried Alive. Billings, Mont., March 10.—Big Rock, a member of the Crow tribe, was buried alive by mistake near Pryor, on the Crow agency, yesterday. He was about 40 years of age. He had been ill, and some time ago apparently died, and was interred with all of the honors of tribal custom yesterday.

His squaw, while mourning over the grave, which was comparatively shallow, heard sounds that seemed to come from the resting place of the brave whom she thought dead. Terrified, the squaw hurried away and reported the news to the other Indians, and the grave was opened.

Big Rock, it was discovered, had kicked the top from the coffin, and turned over in his frenzied efforts to escape. He was dead, however, when the grave was opened.

New York, March 10.—Kwagina had a dream, and in it he thought he heard the great Manitou call to him from the happy hunting grounds, where his forefathers dwelt, and where his own soul had gone to reside.

Like a true Sioux, he hearkened to the summons. While the arms of his pretty young squaw encircled his neck and whispered soothing words to him, he, reaching into his hip pocket and pulled out a deringer, pulled the trigger and sent a bullet into his right eye, before the little woman who clung to him could grasp the terrible thing he had done.

When he returned Thursday night from the performance at the New Star theater, which adjourned with his squaw, he was morose and gloomy.

"Morning Star, I have dreamed a dream," he said to his squaw. "The dream was that my brother and I, the great Manitou are calling me to a land of million campfires. I must go to the camp of my fathers."

Kwagina is a full-blooded Sioux and hails from North Dakota.

INTERSTATE BOARD TO
PROBE COAL RATES

Washington, March 10.—In compliance with the joint resolution of congress, approved March 7, 1906, in the matter of the relation of common carriers to coal and oil and the transportation of the same, the interstate commerce commission has directed that a proceeding of inquiry and investigation be instituted at once and that such proceeding be set for hearing at such time and place and that such persons be required to appear and testify as to produce books, documents and papers, as the commission may hereafter direct, and further that the inquiry be carried on in the meantime by such other means and methods as may be deemed appropriate.

SENATE VOTES TO
ADMIT OKLAHOMA

New State as Provided in Bill Includes Oklahoma and Indian Territory.

Washington, March 10.—The senate yesterday passed a bill for the admission of a new state to be called Oklahoma and to be composed of the territory of Oklahoma and Indian territory. It was the house joint resolution with all the provisions relating to Arizona and New Mexico struck out. The motion to strike out was made by Mr. Burrows, and it was carried by the close vote of 37 to 35, after having been lost in committee of the whole by the still closer vote of 35 to 36.

Opinion differs as to the course the house will pursue in meeting the situation presented by the adverse vote of the senate. An effort will certainly be made to secure concurrence by the house in the amendments made by the senate. The matter probably will be deferred several days for the absence of many republicans and democrats who desire to vote on the subject.

It is the plan of Speaker Cannon and his friends to send the matter to conference in the hope of inducing the senate to recede.

What the Bill Provides. As amended by the senate the bill provides for the creation of the state of Oklahoma out of Oklahoma and Indian Territories upon the adoption of a constitutional convention with 110 members, fifty-five of whom are to be chosen by each of the territories comprising the state, is provided for, and all male citizens or male Indians 21 years of age are made eligible to elect delegates to the convention.

As amended by the senate the bill provides for the creation of the state of Oklahoma out of Oklahoma and Indian Territories upon the adoption of a constitutional convention with 110 members, fifty-five of whom are to be chosen by each of the territories comprising the state, is provided for, and all male citizens or male Indians 21 years of age are made eligible to elect delegates to the convention.

Provision is made for the support of higher education and charitable institutions.

Guthrie Is Temporary Capital. Two districts for the United States courts, one in Oklahoma and the other in Indian Territory, are provided for. Guthrie is made the temporary seat of government, but the house provision continuing it in that capacity until 1915 is eliminated.

Owing to the fact that the senate took recess yesterday afternoon last night, Mr. Beveridge's speech was not proceeded with his speech in support of the joint resolution bill when yesterday afternoon he resumed his speech.

Mr. Beveridge contended that the necessity for interpreters for the benefit of the Mexican population was rapidly passing, and suggesting that a little attention should be given to the pledge of statehood given when the Territory of Arizona was created, because it had been given as the result of fraudulent representations.

Mr. Foraker made the first speech under the ten-minute rule. He pointed out that Arizona was not asking admission to the union, but that she had had an unwilling territorial constitution.

Speeches were made by other senators as follows: Mr. Spooner said that Mr. Beveridge's speech was at variance with the former reports of the committee on territories; Mr. Nelson advocated the union of Arizona and New Mexico as the best plan for the Americanization of New Mexico.

When at 4 o'clock the gavel fell at the end of Mr. Beveridge's final appeal the voting was begun. The amendments suggested by the committee were first read and no objection to them was made until the proposed appropriation for defraying the expenses of preliminary elections to be held in the proposed state of Oklahoma. The amendment to increase the vote of 31 to 40, the increase of the election apportionment for Arizona from \$150,000 to \$175,000 also was disagreed to.

The first test of strength came on these amendments, and the committee opponents of joint statehood scored a victory. The object of striking out the increases was to avoid the necessity of having a constitutional convention when returned to the house of representatives.

Under the rules of the house any bill amended by the senate is referred to a committee and considered in committee of the whole. The opponents of joint statehood desired to afford an opportunity by motion to concur in the amendments without such reference.

As soon as the committee amendments were disposed of, Mr. Foraker formally offered his amendments, and gave a separate vote on joint statehood.

Yeas and Nays. The vote was immediately taken and the amendment carried by the decisive vote of 42 yeas to 33 nays.

The next formal vote was taken on Mr. Burrows' motion to strike out of the bill all that part relating to Arizona and New Mexico. The rollcall resulted in the loss of the motion by the narrow result of one vote—35 yeas to 36 nays.

Mr. Burrows gave notice that he would renew the amendment when the bill was reported to the senate.

Mr. Teller of the senate, in a provision continuing Guthrie as the capital of the proposed state of Oklahoma until 1915 was struck out by the vote of 39 to 31. The effect of the amendment is to fix the capital at that city only temporarily.

The proceedings up to this time had been in committee of the whole. When the bill was reported to the senate, Mr. Burrows renewed his motion to strike out of the part of the bill relating to Arizona and New Mexico, and this time it prevailed by the vote of 37 to 35. The changes in the bill were as follows: Mr. Burrows and Overman, who transferred his pair with Clark of Arkansas to Carmack and voted in the affirmative.

The bill as amended was then passed by unanimous vote.

Chicago, March 10.—Jimmy Seebing does not intend to fight for the Chicago Nationals this year, blacklist or no blacklist, according to a letter sent by him to the chairman of the local committee of the Chicago club, President Murphy. On receipt of it the local magnate closed a deal with the Wheeling club, a New Mexico stricker out. Mr. Seebing's letter is in response to a request for his defense against charges of tampering with Chicago's players.

President Murphy denies Seebing's statement that he has given the player permission to remain in Wheeling for any stated time or purpose.

Coast Battle Between Jack (Twin) Sullivan and Kelly Ended Unsuccessfully.

Los Angeles, Cal., March 10.—Jack (Twin) Sullivan and Hugo Kelly of Chicago fought twenty three rounds to draw here last night, but the decision was protested by Tommy Ryan, Kelly's manager.

It was the fourth round that Kelly landed a hard right to the nose and Sullivan slipped to the floor. His nose began to bleed profusely, and he hit his own groin. In attempting to wipe the blood away Kelly sneezed in his nose and was bewildered through the next succeeding four rounds.

In the fourteenth round Kelly slipped over a hard right to the jaw and fell to the floor for the count of eight.

During the remainder of the round Sullivan was forced to clinch and hold on to avoid punishment. Frequently during the fight Kelly would land a heavy blow on Sullivan's left eye, and in several instances had the Boston boy in a bad way.
