MANY ARE INJURED TO SUE THE G. G. W. IN TRAIN WRECK FOR BACK TAXES

GREAT WESTERN PASSENGER FALLS DOWN STEEP BANK.

Broken Rail on Curve Causes Engine and Cars to Leave Track, Finally Stopping at Bottom of Grade—Speed of Train Prevents Telescoping and Fatalities.

When the attorney general's department brings suit against the Great Western to collect the per cent tax for 1905, it will also sue for an additional 1 per cent on the gross earnings for every year from 1896 to 1904 inclusive. The road has never paid more than 2 per cent on its main line, and the state contends that it should have paid 3 per cent under the general law. (The amount involved will be over \$100,000, and would be larger if the state could go back farther than 1896. The statute of limitations used to run against the state in collection of taxes outlawing everything over 6 years old. In 1902 the legislature abolished it, so everything from 1896 down can be reached. The 1902 law may be challenged, however, because the title makes it apply only to real estate taxes, and railroads are in part personal property.)

The same issue is involved in suing for these back taxes that is presented in the suit for the per cent tax on 1905. The road has paid the 2 per cent on the claim that its charter fixed that rate as a perpetual contract, and the state has never before attempted to collect more.

The Great Western has paid none of its 1905 tax so far, and the state will ask for the 2 per cent payment at once. The state treasurer has turned over the Great Northern's draft to the attorney general's department for collection of the \$120,000 in controversy. R. A. Stone, one of the assistants, is preparing the complaint, and when Attorney General Young returns from his vacation it will be all ready to file.

The unpaid balance of the Western Union's 1905 taxes is also in the attorney general's hands for collection.

GADETS MUST JOIN AT COMPANY DRILLS

Farmers can get the prison twine delivered at their station for about 10 cents. The sisal twine is 7 1/2 cents to dealers, which, with profit and freight added, will make it about the same price to farmers as the state's sisal and standard twine.

SAMPSON LEADS EXCELSIOR 'WETS' WILL SEEK RE-ELECTION.

George Mungler, One of the Nominees on Regular Ticket, Changes Front and Becomes a Pronounced "Dry" Final Shots Fired in Hot Campaign Which Culminates Tomorrow.

An independent ticket, with L. F. Sampson, the present mayor, a candidate for re-election, and other prominent high-license advocates running for seats in the council, probably will be put before the voters of the Excelsior village this evening. This will complicate the situation and be a dangerous move against the regular ticket adopted at the caucus Saturday night, the "drys" still have no fear that license will win, as the water and most important question will be decided by separate ballot.

The temperance folk admit that Mayor Sampson will be a most formidable opponent of C. T.
