## City News

### BACK FROM THE MINES

ACE P. ABELL RETURNS FROM MEXICO JUBILANT OVER PROSPECTS OF MINNESOTA OWNERS.

Ace P. Abell, former clerk of the probate court, now interested in mining, returned to Minneapolis today from Sonora, Mexico, where he spent some time looking over the holdings of the Minnesota men who own the Belen mine. Jhon Christy of the Chamber of Commerce is now on the property. General George P. Wilson and C. W. Sexton probably will visit the mine. Mr. Abell found Sonora very interesting, and, climatically, very delightful. This north Mexico state is largely mountainous and much of the table land is 3,600 feet above sea level, with peaks as high as 11,000 feet. Hermosillo is the largest town near the mining country now being opened, but the Belen management does its business largely thru Nacozari, a smaller, but important town where a supply center and where the Phelps-Dodge people have a smelter. Business of volume is carried on there and the smelter last year reduced about 10,000,000 pounds of copper from 4 per cent ore.

The Belen mine, operated until now by horsepower and with capacity for raising fifty to eighty tons a day, will soon have modern machinery and increase the output. Two hundred men, mostly Mexicans, under the direction of a native "commissario," are now at work on the property. Mr. Abell believes the development in Sonora, in the next few years, will surpass the mining world. The recent killing of Von Pflieger in North Dakota by the Yaqui Indians, Mr. Abell says, has given many in the north an erroneous idea as to conditions. It was an incident no more representative than would be the killing of a man by some lawless cowboy or bad Indian in North Dakota or Montana. The country is entirely safe and the Yaqui Indians confined principally to a stretch of country toward Ures. They occasionally break out and steal cattle, as do the Indians in our country, but are as promptly rounded up.

### REAL LAKE PAVILLION WILL COME NEXT YEAR

It is now practically certain that the main structure to be built by the street railway company on Big Island will not be put in this year. A handsome and commodious pavilion will be built this year, and later, probably in 1907, it will be superseded by a magnificent casino more elaborate than anything of the sort in the country.

In one respect it will be an innovation in summer-resort structures. It will be of fireproof material throughout, giving the company a permanent structure that will not be a constant fire hazard. The temporary pavilion to be installed this year will be fully adequate. Many of the specialists and amusement features will be installed this year, and others will be added from year to year to replace those that fail to hold their popularity. Some of those proposed are entirely new in the west and will make big hits. Fine musical treats are promised throughout the summer. In addition there will be ample provision for bathing for men, women and children, and exceptional picnic arrangements.

After a thorough inspection of the hulls of the new dispatch boats now building at the company's Thirty-first street shops for the Minnetonka service next summer, the state boiler inspectors, who also have charge of inspections of all passenger boats, announce that they are the best ever. All the boats were carefully inspected and all passed with flying colors, the verdict being that in a point of material and scientific construction they are A 1.

### GETS REAL SHAMROCK

Captain Stretton's Father Sends Ireland's Emblem from Home.

Fresh from the Emerald isle, with some of the "owid sod" clinging to its roots, a package of real shamrock has been received at the Salvation Army headquarters.

"Picked from the old dike at the bottom of my father's farm, where I used to find it when I was a boy," said Captain Richard Stratton, the recipient of the consignment. "It grows close to the ground, so close that the cattle can't eat it, and you have a look sharp to find it. The shamrock I must have when St. Patrick's day comes 'round, and every year my father sends it to me. Knockree farm, near Ballyheigue in the county of Kerry, province of Munster, and only a little ways from the lakes of Killarney, is where this came from."

The shamrock for which Captain Stratton vouches is very different from the artificial leaves sold at this time of the year. Smaller than the white clover leaf and growing several leaves in a bunch instead of on the single stock, as with the white clover, the shamrock is an inconspicuous plant unless the beholder is an Irishman.

### IMPROVES LAKE ESTATE

E. J. Longyear Plans Elaborate House at Tonka.

One of the striking improvements at Lake Minnetonka this year will be upon the estate of E. J. Longyear. Mr. Longyear has bought the Muckey farm at Minnewashta station. The property contains about 100 acres with two-thirds of a mile of shore line on the upper lake. Mr. Longyear has ordered plans from the eighth company and they have been completed, ready for contractors' bids. These provide for a long rambling house of Dutch colonial style of architecture. The building will be 125 feet long, two stories high and with an enormous amount of porch space.

The heavy timbered grounds are naturally fitted for elaborate landscaping. A circular pool, when elaborated, will make a natural inclosed harbor for the Longyear water craft. The cost of the house will be between \$20,000 and \$25,000.


