BIG DEAL MADE IN CANADIAN LANDS

MINNEAPOLIS HEADS SYNDICATE THAT BUYS 300,000 ACRES.

F. A. Bean of New Prague and Associates Purchase Big Tracts in Eastern Saskatchewan Wheat Belt—Huge Steam Plow to Break the Ground as Soon as Frost Goes.

Announcement was made in Minneapolis today of a colossal land purchase in the western Canada wheat belt. The tract has been taken over by an American-Canadian syndicate, headed by F. A. Bean, a member in New York, Minn. The Canadian interests are represented by W. H. Montague, formerly Canadian minister of agriculture.

It is also given ample authority to require railroads to put passenger and sleeping cars in sanitary condition.


