CADET UNIFORMS DUE FOR EARLY DELIVERY

TODAY'S DRILLS

Eighth Ward Republican hall, Nicollet avenue and Lake street; 4 p.m. Drummond hall, Fifteenth avenue and Second street NE; 7:30 p.m.

All cadets who desire to be measured for uniforms are asked to call at recruiting headquarters, second floor, 51 Fourth street S, adjoining The Journal building, between 2 and 6 o'clock p.m.

The uniforming of the cadets as fast as they are complying with requirements, for The Journal Cadet regiment, is in progress. This may be done without delaying drills. The recruiting office at 51 Fourth street S will be open until further notice from 2 to 6 p.m., when measurements will be taken. It is expected that the first lot of uniforms will be ready for delivery within a week.

Last night thirty cadets drilled at St. Mark's church, 125 at the Third Ward republican hall and 60 at Labor Temple. All the companies are doing well, and drilling by squads will soon begin, which will make progress still more rapid. Some important announcements about this will be made in Sunday's Journal.

To Size and Form Squads.

The cadets are placed in column according to height at facing distance, the tallest man in front.

Command: In two ranks form squad (1) march (2) front.

At the command march the first man faces to the left, the second man places himself in the rear rank, covering the first at a distance of forty inches; both place the left hand upon the hip; the other men, close in in quick time and form alternately in front and rear rank, as explained for the first two, each man facing to the left upon arriving at his proper place, then dressing to the right.

All the cadets having formed, the instructor commands: front. Each man turns his head and eyes to the front and drops his left hand by the side.

The squad having been sized, the cadets are cautioned to take the same relative position when the instructor is formed thereafter, altho positions are sometimes changed at drill for the purpose of instruction.

To form the squad, the corporal places himself three paces in front of where the center is to be formed and commands: Fall in.

The cadets assemble at attention at their proper places in double rank, arms at the order, each man turning to the right as soon as the man on his left has the interval.

The instructor then commands: Count off.

At this command, all except the right file execute eyes right, and beginning on the right the men in each rank count successively one, two, three, four; each man turns his head and eyes to the front, as he counts.
