WOMAN SEES FATAL SHOOTING OF A MAN

Chicago, March 19.—Nicholas J. Dickhoff, 23 years old, of Cincinnati, Ohio, who was employed as a cook in a boarding house at 440 La Salle avenue, was shot and fatally wounded early today by Jacob W. Young, while in the room of Mrs. Mildred Amann at the Grace hotel. Dickhoff was taken to the Chicago emergency hospital, where he died a few hours later. Young, who is 18 years old, Mrs. Amann and Mrs. Mabel Greif, all of Cincinnati, were arrested and are being held by the police.

Mrs. Amann was in the room at the time Young shot Dickhoff, but Mrs. Greif, fearing a quarrel between the two men, had left a short time before the shooting. Dickhoff and Young, it is alleged, went to the hotel Sunday evening to see Mrs. Amann and Mrs. Greif, both of whom they knew in Cincinnati. Mrs. Amann, it is said, is the wife of a maltster in that city, but she and Mrs. Greif had separated from their husbands.

TAFT TRAINS DOWN; 50 POUNDS LIGHTER

Washington, March 19.—Secretary Taft has reduced his weight nearly fifty pounds. When he gets rid of sixteen more pounds of flesh one of his ambitions in life will be realized. When Secretary Taft returned from the Philippines he weighed 313 pounds, and he then adopted a system of exercise and dieting which has reduced his weight to 266.5-16 pounds, which means a loss of 46.5-16 pounds. When Mr. Taft reduces his weight to 250 pounds he will discontinue dieting, but will not give up horseback riding and the other exercise he takes every day. He has stood the strain well. Mr. Taft's friends have warned him against his persistent course in dieting and taking rigorous exercise, declaring that he is endangering his health by doing so. Mr. Taft, in his health by doing so. Mr. Taft has that he never was in better health and that there is no indication of a nervous collapse due to the starving process to which he has subjected himself.

JUSTICE TO USE REFORM SPELLING

Brewer Will Write His Opinions in New Simplified Forms.

New York, March 19.—"I have agreed to use the new simplified method of spelling in writing my opinions," said Associate Justice David F. Brewer of the United States supreme court when asked concerning his opinion of the new movement. "For some time I have followed the practice of shortening my spelling of certain words as 'altho', 'thru' and 'program.' Of course, I cannot control the actions of the supreme court in the matter of spelling, but I have adopted the new method for my own use.

The spelling of many educated men is atrocious. They never learn to spell according to the rules of the English language. But if the simplified method is adopted I believe it will help them.

A simplified spelling board has been organized for the purpose of bringing about reform in spelling. The head of this organization is Brander Matthews and other officers in the organization are leaders in educational and other lines of work. I am a member of this society. We have agreed whenever possible to use the new method of spelling.

There are twelve words which the members of the organization have agreed to spell in the new way when they remember to do so. These words are: 'altho', 'thru', 'catalog', 'thorofare', 'thru', 'throust', 'catalog', 'demagog', and 'pedagog.'

SHORTHAND AS PATH TO BIBLE FOR INDIANS

New York, March 19.—In the Canadian northwest, along the banks of the Thompson and Fraser rivers, dwell several scattered tribes of Indians. To them, some time ago, came Father Lejeune, a Brittany priest. He found his efforts to christianize the tribesmen hampered by the ignorance of the Indians, who could not read the Bible. The solution of the problem took the remarkable form of a determination to teach the Indians shorthand. He took first a few of the most intelligent men of the tribe, and with considerable difficulty made of them passable shorthand scholars. Then he sent them among the other tribesmen to impart to them the knowledge they had acquired. Today there scarcely is an Indian in that district who cannot read and write. At the church, in which the Indians assemble in such numbers that the building is rarely able to hold them all, their books are in shorthand.

The news of his great success traveled far and at last was carried to the Vatican, where it greatly impressed the pope. Orders were given for the minting of a thousand medals, and these have been sent to Father Lejeune, with instructions to present a medal to each of the Indians making unusual progress in the mastery of the word-sign language.

The shorthand tribes live about 300 miles northwest of Victoria, in the interior of British Columbia.

BARONESS A SUICIDE IN FORT LEAVENWORTH

Leavenworth Kan., March 19.—Caroline von Dem Busche, said to be the divorced wife of Baron von Dem Busche Haddenhausen, a German baron of Berlin, committed suicide yesterday by hanging at the head of the stairs of her son, Second Lieutenant Carl Frederick von Dem Busche, of the Eighteenth infantry, U. S. A., at Fort Leavenworth. Lieutenant von Dem Busche is a cousin of Frederick von Dem Busche Haddenhausen, first secretary of the German embassy at Washington. The officers of the fort decline to make known any definite facts regarding the affair.

Mrs. von Dem Busche killed herself by firing a bullet into her head in her room, adjoining her son's private room, where she had lived with him for some time past. She is known to have been treated last summer for a nervous disease at Denver, where the family formerly lived.

Baron von Dem Busche and his wife are said to have come to the United States from Prussia, where he was believed to have owned large estates several years ago. He was a mining engineer and for many years lived at Denver, where the son was born.

BERKMAN TO TAKE UP MOST'S MANTLE

Pittsburg, March 19.—Alexander Berkman will be released from the Allegheny county workhouse May 18, after having served fourteen years there and in the penitentiary for the attempted assassination of H. C. Frick in July, 1892. When he is released he will take up the mantle of Herr Most and follow in the footsteps of that anarchist. From the moment he leaves the workhouse until he or Mr. Frick is called to their final account, he will be under espionage by one of the leading detective agencies of the country.

There is mourning in Pittsburg's anarchist colony over the death of Most, but it is mixed with rejoicing that the release of Berkman is only two months distant.

Superintendent A. E. Leslie said today: "Berkman wants to be looked upon as a martyr and a god, and that is how he is going to be treated when he gets out. He expects to be the anarchist leader, and while he affects to despise newspapers, he is really anxious to get all the free advertising he can which will help him to the end he aspires to."
