A "low" over Kentucky is accompanied by cloudy and unsettled weather in the Mississippi valley and thence eastward, with rain in Illinois this morning in the Ohio valley, Tennessee and Georgia and snow in Maryland, the western parts of Pennsylvania and New York, southern Michigan, southern Wisconsin, Illinois and Missouri, and during the past twenty-four hours there has been precipitation as far west as northern New Mexico, Colorado and Wyoming.

FOUR GRADES OF CREAM RAGTIME IS A DEAD ONE

COMMISSIONER SLATER DEFINES CLASSIFICATION NOW TO BE USED BY TRADE.
E. K. Slater, state dairy and food commissioner, issued a circular today to producers and buyers of hand separator cream, explaining the new system of grading cream framed by the department and adopted by the central creamery plants that buy shipped cream. The circular says in part: "This department desires to call the attention of producers and buyers of cream to the state to the provisions of law which makes it a misdemeanor to offer for sale or sell impure, unwholesome or adulterated cream, and also the manufacture of such cream into any article of food."

Blind Piger Fined.—Patrick Dubo, arrested last week on a charge of selling liquor without a license in his confectionery store at Washington, Twenty-third avenue N., was convicted in police court today and fined \$100. He was arrested on a complaint sworn out by Assistant License Inspector Strelow.
Annie Peterson Fined.—Annie Peterson, who admitted to the police Saturday that she had stolen a purse from a woman in a crowd, was charged with wanting to keep her children in school, was let off with a fine in police court today. After she had told her story Judge E. F. White imposed a sentence of \$30 or ten days.

Robbed on Streetcar.—Oscar Widen, 3241 Nicollet avenue, reported to the police today that his pocket had been touched for \$23 by a thief while he was riding home on a streetcar last evening. He was in a crowd and several men stood close to him for several blocks. When he arrived home he discovered from his pocketbook had been taken from his hip pocket.
