RANKIN RETIRES AS STATE INSPECTOR

A. W. Rankin, state inspector of graded schools, will retire at the end of the current school year, Aug. 1, to accept a chair in the department of pedagogy in the state university. He was elected to the position a year or two ago, but on account of the destruction of the main building and the cramped quarters left for the department, he did not enter on the work. The state high school board, which elects the inspectors, will meet at the capitol next Wednesday to choose Mr. Rankin's successor. The election is made at this time so that the man chosen will have time to prepare for the work. There are sixteen applicants for the board to consider, but their names will not be announced. The letters applying for the place are regarded as confidential.

EXPERT FINDS FAULT WITH STAGE GREASER

Captain Jack Hart, of Minneapolis, scout, pony express rider, Indian fighter, hotel keeper and raconteur, who has seen "The Bandit," as played by E. Frederick Hawley and company at the Orpheum, is finding fault with some of the technicalities of the production, which purports to picture melodramatic conditions in the far southwest. "The first thing I noticed," says the man who began riding pony express across the plains when Kansas City was the jumping place, "was that the greaser (Mr. Hawley) lights his cigaret with a match from one of those match boxes of commerce that he pulls out of his shirt. Now what he ought to have is a tin of matches, or a tin of matches that come in blocks of a hundred and stick in your hand. And then he ought to strike the match on the barrel of his revolver or the rowel of his spur.

"And there's something the girl does that's way wrong. When she gets the gun from the peon (Mr. Howe) she ought to hang onto it. Instead of that, after she's got the drop on the greaser, she goes and lays it on the lounge, and him with a gun in his holster all the time. This won't do, because he's got his gun and she's got the drop on her until she runs back and gets it. She ought to peek the gun all the time.

"I should say that the costuming was good, but too new. Mr. Hawley, or whatever his name is, wears those holsters and soaks them in ochre and oil. That would give them the look of having seen a little wear and tear, which they are supposed to have seen. The costumes are too fresh for business out on the plains.

"Barring this thing, the greaser's makeup is good and his shoulders are handled just right when he gets that sort of shrug I've seen a million greasers get. His talk is all right, too. It's good where he says 'him' for 'her' all the time. Greasers don't make any distinction between the male and female gender, between 'mochacho' and 'mochacha,' when they're trying the English language.

"That's good where he stuffs a handkerchief into the bullet hole. That's greaser nature. I've seen lots of 'em do it, so to keep blood enough in them to accomplish their purpose.

"The acting is mighty good and he played his greaser great, but there's a lot of small points that wouldn't go west of here, at least not when they get out in the cow-puncher country."

GOOD INDIAN STORIES

Third Adventure Related by Col. Blake in Next Sunday Journal.

The third story of adventure narrated by Col. J. Y. F.
