ST. PAUL MAN COMMITS SUICIDE IN MILWAUKEE

Milwaukee, Wis., March 26.—"My name is Frank Bradley, and my home used to be at St. Paul. I have no home there now. Bad health is the cause of this."

Illegibly scribbled on a scrap of paper, this message was found in the possession of a man who shot himself Saturday night at the Chicago house here. The man appeared at the place about 11 o'clock Saturday night, and asked for a room. When he failed to appear last night, James Mooney, the proprietor of the hotel, decided to investigate. Mooney went to the room and found the door locked. He forced the door and found the man lying on the bed with a revolver on the floor at his side. The body was cold, and the man had evidently been dead for several hours. He had shot himself thru the right temple, and death was undoubtedly instantaneous. The shot was not heard by any of the roomers at the house during the night.

The man was about 40 years of age, wore the clothes of a workman. He wore a bandana handkerchief about his neck and a mackinaw coat. The body was removed to the morgue.

MORE TOBACCO CHEWED; CAUSE? AUTOMOBILES

New York, March 26.—One of the largest retail tobacco dealers in the United States, whose headquarters are in this city, said today that the consumption of chewing tobacco has increased almost 50 per cent in the last five years. He attributes this increase in no small measure to the automobile. "You see," he explained, "it is impossible to enjoy a cigar or pipe while whizzing along in an automobile. Not only that, but there is always danger of sparks or ashes from a lighted cigar or pipe getting into your own eyes or those of persons sitting behind you in the automobile. As a result, chewing tobacco is becoming general among the automobile enthusiasts and chauffeurs."

BURNING SHIP STRIKES ROCK.

St. Johns, N. F., March 26.—After being in peril from fire at sea and managing by desperate efforts to reach this port in the midst of a gale and blinding snowstorm, the British freight steamer, Titan, struck a submerged rock in entering the harbor Saturday night, had a hole torn in her hull and now lies fast on the beach, where she was run to prevent sinking. The fire in the midship hold is still burning fiercely. It is believed that the greater portion of the cargo has either been burned or ruined by water.

Railroads HILL IS BUILDING MANY EXTENSIONS

NEW ROADS WILL COST ABOUT \$22,000,000.

Line from Seattle to Portland, Involving Harriman Holy of Hollies, Foots Up to \$12,500,000—Other Branches and Feeders Mean Much to System.

New York, March 26.—While James J. Hill is busy in New York and vicinity trying to sell the ore lands to the United States Steel corporation, the Hill engineers are good and busy out in the northwest. The Portland and Seattle railroad is a well-known proposition, both in the west and in the east. The railroad people are watching it, wondering whether or not it will really take the city of Portland from the Harriman disclaim. On this the Great Northern will spend about \$12,500,000 cash, the Northern Pacific spending the rest of the money to complete it.

The Great Northern will spend about \$5,500,000 on an extension to make a new connection with the Burlington between Sioux City, Iowa, and Omaha. This extension involves the building of 112 miles of new road and is important as indicating the trend of co-operation between these two parts of the Hill system.

Coal Road Plans.
About \$4,500,000 is to be spent on the V. V. & E. and the Washington & Great Northern, building jointly the lines across the British Columbia border from Washington. This is supposed to be largely a coal proposition. Another branch line in the same country, not yet begun, will cost about \$1,200,000. This whole project is thought by some to be the western terminus of a new line that will bid for the transcontinental traffic of Victoria, to compete with the Canadian Pacific's new line to Spokane. This theory is not accepted in railroad circles here, as the road is not being laid down like a trunk line, but like a good local traffic railway.

Two small spurs run north from St. John, N. D., to the Canadian frontier, and perhaps across it. One of them is supposed to be aimed at Brandon, and is intended to take Canadian Pacific amidships, so to speak. The whole amount of building in this section is probably covered by \$1,500,000.

An important 200-mile line is to be sent thru to Billings, Mont., to connect with the Northern Pacific and Burlington at that strategic point. The real object of this extension is not known. It looks a little like another scheme in the general proposition of making traffic more easily interchangeable between these systems, and does not seem to have much transcontinental importance. The cost will probably be about \$4,500,000 or more.

Other Coast Branches.
About \$1,250,000 will probably be needed to complete the company's double-tracking contract between Seattle and Everett. A retaining wall will be needed most of the way, which brings the cost up tremendously. Contracts are let.

About \$1,300,000 or less will complete two or three small feeders under way in Montana. These lines are designed merely to hold the traffic of the road against new roads, the Milwaukee and other possible arrivals.

Elevated work in the twin cities is estimated at various values. Probably \$1,250,000 is liberal for it.

In all, the program at present on the surface calls for the expenditure of over \$22,000,000 on lines in the north and the northwest within the next two or three years. It is not possible even to guess what new projects Mr. Hill is contemplating that are still beneath the surface.

A lot of talk that comes out of the west with regard to invasion of the Canadian northwestern prairie lands may be forgotten as soon as heard. Hill may go into the Canadian northwest with a feeder or two, but it is believed here that he has no extensive plan for a Canadian invasion such as is talked about.

EXPERTS ARE PUZZLED

Harriman's Coast Enterprises Not Plain on Surface.

New York, March 26.—Speculative interest in the possible Harriman plans with regard to Seattle terminals and other extensions in coastwise territory is pretty much confined to guesses at the form in which the money will be raised to do all these things. It is pretty well recognized around here that the Harriman railways will spend, in addition to the outlays mentioned in the report, something well over \$20,000,000 for new lines in Washington and out toward Butte.

The plans, as Wall Street sees them, seem to contemplate the extension to Seattle, more in defense than in aggression. The whole affair is somewhat puzzling to the average railroad expert. There is a sneaking suspicion in the minds of the majority that the plans for a coast line from Portland to Seattle are only part of a general scheme, and that this coastwise line will never be built at all by the Harriman lines.

The argument is laid down this way by an engineer and made his reputation in the Pacific northwest: "I don't see anything in the Portland-Seattle line at all. It will cost two-thirds as much to build as it would to build from the southeastern corner of Washington to Tacoma and Seattle, and it won't get one-half the results. Local business from Portland to Seattle is a mere drop in the bucket compared with the thru business out of Seattle eastward."

"That local business from terminus to terminus of such a line is taken in competition with the all-water route, and throughout it is true, but yet there to make the rates. That division of the Northern Pacific is not a great money-maker, and there is no cash in building a new line to rival an old one that can't make any money worth while."

"A Harriman line from up the river, on the contrary, would make things hum in the state of Washington. If it should turn out that Harriman is merely pulling the chestnuts out of the fire for one of those three or four projected lines from near Umatilla to Seattle, in other words, securing franchises to be used by a cross-state line, it would be worth while to watch the fur fly between the new line and the Northern Pacific."

DR. ALBERT P. MARBLE DEAD.

New York, March 26.—Dr. Albert Prescott Marble, assistant superintendent of public schools of this city, died at 44, today. He was superintendent of schools at Omaha. He was elected president of the National Education association at the Nashville convention in 1888.

Memphis, Tenn., March 26.—For the past few weeks the negroes of Memphis have been making their arrangements to absent themselves from Memphis until after March 27, the date fixed for the sinking of the city by a crazy negro. Altho the prophetess has been sent to a lunatic asylum, the alarm has not subsided and many a Memphis housewife is mourning the loss of her cook. So serious was the talk that the railroads have advertised excursions to leave here tonight and return on Wednesday.

The negroes preached to vast crowds of her color nightly, until the police got wind of the matter. With the zeal and fervor of a fanatic, she described in great detail the disaster in store for Memphis, how the city would crumble by the acre into the Mississippi river and how the skyscrapers would be engulfed in the turbid torrent.
