Anthony, who died recently. In June the voters of the state will decide the question of woman suffrage, and a heated campaign is on.

Miss Anthony was accompanied to the west by the Rev. Anna B. Shaw of Philadelphia, who was selected by Susan B. Anthony to be invited to take up her work with her sister.
