THE ZOOH RECITAL

Hermann Zoch presented his Brahms program at the First Unitarian church last evening to a good-sized audience. The same program was given in the fall of 1905 by Mr. Zoch, who was a slightly different arrangement of the numbers.

A Brahms program is a strenuous thing to listen to and certainly strenuous to render. Mr. Zoch has achieved wonders in his recital program and is not the least of them. It should be said that his rendition last evening was better than that of four years ago. It was characterized by the same intelligent apprehension of the composer's thought, the same patient devotion to the preparation of the recital, the same technical technique and the same phenomenal memory.

Brahms is emotional, but introspectively so. It requires deep and concentrated effort to appreciate, understand and enjoy him. Doubtless the vocalists struck the most popular responsive chord in the audience. The free-flowing melodies, interwoven with harmonic nuances, were grateful after the more involved compositions which preceded them. The miracle of Brahms composing the sonata played last evening, the "Fifth," while under 20 years of age, will never be explained. The Lullaby, taken from Op. 11 and Op. 118, were interesting and alluring. The twenty-eight variations on the Paganini theme closed the evening. They are interesting only to demonstrate the ingenuity and fecundity of musical expression of the composer and to display the virtuosity of the performer. In each of these they are highly successful. —Howard Boardman.
