Minneapolis Chamber of Commerce, April 3.—Duluth stepped to the front and center today and led the grain markets. Chicago was closed for election day. It was expected that Chicago's fine hand would be felt here in manipulation, and that the big traders in the closed market, who are bulls, would take advantage of the situation to work up the outside markets, the better to insure a higher general opening tomorrow and a bare report for Chicago.
