CLUBS AND CHARITIES

The annual meeting of the fifth district of the State Federation of Women's clubs, annual meeting, directors' club, will be held tomorrow at 2:30 p.m. in the directors' room of the public library, will be of unusual importance as matters pertaining to the entertainment of the biennial convention will be discussed. FREE LAND GOING FAST

PIERRE, S. D.—March showed a greater number of filings in the Pierre land office than any other month since the office was established, with 317 homesteads, 21 water declaratories and 11 declaratories, making a total of 349 quarter sections taken. This is a total of 58,541 acres, or nearly three townships. Seventy-eight contests were filed during the month. No question as to sufficiency of residence or improvements is raised, but the entry is attacked on the question of good faith on the part of the entryman. DIED ALONE BEFORE FIRE

MITCHELL, S. D.—The body of Mrs. Rose Diehl was found in her home at Mount Vernon, she having died of heart failure. For ten days she had not been seen at her home or in town, and search was made for her, ever her house was entered, but she was still missing. It was supposed she had gone away on a visit. Later neighbors again entered her home and she was found in a kneeling position in front of the kitchen stove with a white shawl thrown over her head and shoulders. She was seen that way before, but visitors thought it was a shawl lying on the chair. She died on the night of March 21 as she was in the act of building a fire in the stove. She was 68.

BUMP NEARLY PROVES FATAL

FOSTON, MINN.—A bump on the head nearly proved fatal to Oscar Carlson, living on a farm west of here, and he is now recovering from convulsion of the brain and suffering from paralysis. Carlson had just moved to the Knute Grundy place and after dark had occasion to go into the stable. Being unfamiliar with the place, he struck his head against a low doorway with such force that he fell to the ground unconscious. He remained unconscious for some time after being carried into the house. When he recovered it was discovered that he was totally paralyzed. This condition was somewhat relieved by attending physicians, and he now has partial use of his limbs. Doctors say that Carlson had a narrow escape from instant death, being saved by the fact that a heavy growth of hair on his head acted as a cushion and shielded him from the full effects of the blow.

BARBOO SCENERY IN DANGER

BARBOO, WIS.—W. C. Rodgers, for several years in charge of the prospecting for the Pittsburg Steel company, in quest of additional iron mines in Barboo, Wis., has given up the project and has pointed the American Refractory company of West Virginia for the purpose of manufacturing brick from the Barboo iron. The company has recently purchased fifty-seven acres on the east Devils Lake bluff, which is almost a solid mass of quartzite. The rock will be shipped to Peoria, Ill., where it will be converted into cement brick. The people of Barboo and vicinity are protesting against a move of this kind as it will in time destroy the scenery. Devils Lake is one of the most picturesque spots in the northwest. The state legislature has passed a law to secure the site for a state park, fearing that corporations at some future time would get possession and destroy one of the most popular summer resorts in Wisconsin.

OSCEOLA, WIS.—Nicollet Smith, aged 85, a prosperous farmer, was thrown from a wagon loaded with milk. The wagon passed over his body, inflicting internal injuries from which he died.
