FEAR FOR LIFE OF AN AERONAUT

Paul Noquet Missing—Balloon Was Found on the Seashore.

New York, April 4.—The balloon in which Paul Noquet, the sculptor, made an ascension late yesterday, was found at 10 o'clock last night on Jones' beach on the south shore of Long Island. Captain Austin of the life-saving station reported today that the balloon had apparently landed on the beach, where it had been dragged along some distance in the sand. Tracks about the balloon seem to indicate that the aeronaut had saved himself. Near the spot where the balloon was discovered there are a number of cottages and shanties, to any one of which Noquet may have gone for refuge for the night if he alighted safely. The crew of the Jones beach life-saving station were on this morning searching for any further traces of the missing aeronaut. The balloon was last seen before it disappeared in an easterly direction over Long Island at 9 o'clock last night, and friends of Noquet feared that he had been carried out to sea. Members of the Aero club, however, expressed the belief that Noquet had made a successful descent with the aid of his parachute before the balloon reached the seashore. M. Noquet, who has been in this country only a few years, has become a naturalized American citizen and has obtained distinction in his art. He has three pieces of sculpture in the present exhibition of the society of American artists in the Fine Arts building. The parachute car on his balloon is so arranged that when the gas bag is deflated the car extends and forms a parachute, which will make a descent easy and gradual. The fact that Dr. Noquet was provided with a life preserver, gave some comfort to his friends tonight when it was feared that the balloon had drifted out to sea.

EXPERTS REFUSE HIS WITHDRAWAL

Say He Must Compete in Coming Play or Stay Out Forever.

DEACON KOEHLER QUILTS LAWRENCE

Will Coach Denverites for Victory Over Colorado School of Mines.

Appleton, Wis., April 4.—"Deacon" John Koehler, under the resignation as coach and physical director at Lawrence university Monday, to take effect at the end of the present college year. He has accepted an offer at the University of Wisconsin, where he will be greatly missed at Lawrence, as he was the best coach that the Methodists have ever had. The two years he spent at the head of athletics here, the Methodists have won the college championship of Wisconsin. Koehler's chief opponent in Colorado will be his old teammate, "Short" Ellsworth, who is coaching the Colorado school of mines. His team has won the championship for two years and it will be Koehler's task to wrest the honor from him. The former maroon player will have a much larger field to pick from in the west than he has here, as there is an enrollment of over twelve hundred. There was never a coach in Appleton as popular with both students and town people as Koehler.

NEW FOOTBALL RULES INDORSED BY HARVARD

Cambridge, Mass., April 4.—Harvard has accepted the football rules drawn up by the American intercollegiate committee, and will probably play the game next season. It was announced last night that at a meeting of the Harvard athletic committee held Monday night, resolutions were adopted declaring in favor of the game under the revised rules. This action is subject to the approval of the board of overseers and the college corporation. With the resolution the following statement was published: "The committee has taken this action after a careful examination of the revised rules of football recently adopted by the American intercollegiate committee. These rules seem to afford a reasonable assurance that a satisfactory game may be played under them, and the committee considers it desirable and expedient for the Harvard team to cooperate with other university teams in the endeavor to test these rules in intercollegiate contests."

BLAKE NESTS ON A. A. U. DELAYS

Sheppard, America's Fast Mile Runner, Not with the Olympian Team.

New York, April 4.—Accompanied by rousing cheers and loyal cries of encouragement, the American team which will compete in the Olympic games at Athens sailed yesterday for Naples on the steamship Barbarossa. There were thirty-two men in the party. The sturdy lads who will represent America against the picked athletes of the world are the best who could spare the time to make the trip, with one exception. That is Martin W. Sheppard, the Philadelphia schoolboy, the fastest mile runner that has appeared in years. Charges of professionalism were made against Sheppard, and have not been sustained. Dilly-dallying on the part of the registration committee of the Amateur Athletic union resulted in the runner being left at home in spite of the desperate efforts of President F. J. Conway, of the Irish-American club. One man was left behind in the person of Dick Sheldon, the former Yale football player and weight thrower. Sheldon had been selected to accompany the big pond men who will train for the various events. They are scheduled to arrive at Naples on April 20, only two days before the games begin. The decks of the steamer will be fixed up for the runners, jumpers and weight-throwers. They will have a gymnasium with all the necessary apparatus and special training table. With an even break with the weather, the athletes should arrive on the shores of Greece ready to demonstrate to the world that America is entitled to the athletic supremacy.
