

Railroads
TROLLEYS ARE COMING
Minneapolis and Chicago Eventually to Be Connected.
Report that the twin cities and Chicago will eventually be connected by trolley is gaining credence as projects for intermediate lines are being put out of foot week by week.
J. H. Metcalf of Oshkosh, an electric railway man, says: "In my opinion the time is not far distant. Electric rail-ways seem to be branching out everywhere. The latest one to be started is from Merrill to Stevens Point via Wausau and Grand Rapids, tapping four of the largest cities in the Wisconsin river valley. Another line that is nearing completion is running from Oshkosh to Kaukauna, and this will connect with the Milwaukee & Northern line, which ultimately will extend to Green Bay. The Oshkosh, Green Bay & Southwest is rapidly nearing completion and

that will open to travel one of the richest sections of land in Wisconsin.
These roads provide a line from Milwaukee to Merrill, half the way to Minneapolis. A line from La Crosse east to meet this road is projected, and the connecting link is expected to be a La Crosse, Winona and Minneapolis road.
FARGO LONGS FOR SOO
Little Prospect that Big System Will Enter North Dakota Metropolis.
The hope which has been latent in the hearts of the Fargo people that the Soo line would build into that city this summer has been revived by the appearance of right-of-way men. They seem to be working from Detroit westward towards Fargo, having already reached Glyndon, ten miles east.
In the outline of the Soo's work for the summer of 1906 no announcement was made of a probable extension to Fargo, although it has been in reach for twenty years. The work that will be done has been definitely outlined, and

it has been given out positively that everything in the way of extension work has been made public.
MOTOR CAR A SUCCESS
Union Pacific Hits Upon Model that Promises Much.
Omaha, Neb., April 6.—The Union Pacific railroad officials at Omaha have been experimenting with their new motor car No. 7, just out of the shops. The car is especially designed for climbing grades and is air, water and dustproof. The first trial run made to Valley and back yesterday developed good climbing ability and a speed of forty miles an hour. The officials were much pleased and believe the result of these experiments will show this to be the best car of the kind in existence.
Travel to Be Cheap.

DAIRYMEN INTERESTED
Fear Pure Food Bill May Harm Their Interests.

Washington, April 6.—Those who have studied the pure-food bill now pending in the house and who are familiar with the provisions that when the bill becomes a law, if any product is used in coloring butter that is deleterious to health, such use will be prohibited. Other provision, requiring the packages containing butter in which artificial coloration is used shall be marked to show that it has been colored, might, it is said, interfere with the sale of that product.
Butter is generally colored with annatto in very small quantities. Other coloring substances are also used to give a rich yellow shade. Friends of the dairy interests have opened up correspondence with officers of dairy organizations with a view to ascertaining whether the bill is likely to affect the sale of their products, in order to be prepared to offer amendments to the bill when it comes up for consideration in the house.

Missouri River Baffled.
The North-Western road's bridge piers at Pierre, S. D., have withstood the spring flood and the ice movement. Inasmuch as the company has finally devised a structure that is equal to peculiar conditions at that point the superstructure, which was removed last fall, will be replaced and the portage of supplies to the other side will continue.

HEARST AGENT ACCUSED
Frauds Alleged in Petitions of Municipal Ownership Ticket.
