### Railroads

#### MOUNTAINS BAFFLE ROAD

MILWAUKEE ENGINEERS SEARCH FOR FEASIBLE ROUTE THROUGH PIPESTONE AND JEFFERSON PASSES.

Special to The Journal. Twin Bridges, Mont., April 13.—H. C. Gray, who has just returned from Homestead, met Milwaukee engineers who had gone out from Butte several weeks ago to find a way thru the Pipestone and Jefferson passes, and reports a survey completed thru the Pipestone. He says that the engineers are working under orders to find a feasible route thru the range in the vicinity of Homestead.

From talk Mr. Gray had with the engineering party it was learned that the road is anxious to find a way across the range without going so far as the Pipestone pass.

This would seem to indicate that the road expects to come by way of Boulder crossing as before, previously reported, instead of by the Jefferson pass, which is already traversed by the Northern Pacific. If the former route is chosen, the crossing of the range near Homestead would save a detour of ten or fifteen miles in swinging around thru the Pipestone.

#### TIERED OF GRADE CROSSINGS

Milwaukee Plans Improvements to Avoid Accidents.

La Crosse, Wis., April 13.—The Milwaukee road has decided upon a complete regrading of its railroad system on the North Side of La Crosse. Early the yards will be moved east of the city, with but one track thru the thickly settled district, or all of the tracks will be elevated and grade crossings avoided. The railroad company has secured options on all the land necessary to establish new yards, and engineers have completed surveys. There are at present, owing to the numerous tracks, too many grade crossing accidents and these are sought to be averted in the new system.

#### RACE FOR THE BORDER

Great Northern and Rainy Lake Roads Do Fast Work.

Virginia, Minn., April 13.—The Duluth, Rainy Lake & Winnipeg and the Great Northern roads are racing thru the northern part of the state in an effort to establish a Canadian border first. The Rainy Lake road has the start, and is building rapidly north of Ashawa, but it is reported that Hill's road will lay a mile of track a day to overtake it. The surveys of the roads show them to be parallel, about thirty miles apart.

#### RAISE GRAIN RATES

Roads, Excepting Wabash, Believe Tariff Is Too Low.

Grain rates from the Mississippi and Missouri rivers will be advanced 2 1/2 cents on May 1 if the Wabash agrees. This road was not represented at the conference when it was decided to change the rates which have been in effect since the first of the year.

It is the intention to cancel the thru rate of 22 1/2 cents from Omaha and Kansas City to Baltimore and the east, and to bill all shipments to Chicago. The new rate will be 11 cents from Omaha and Kansas City to Chicago and 13 1/2 cents from Chicago to Baltimore. This rate apparently is no increase over the old, but when it is taken into consideration that the shipments must be rehandled at Chicago there is a difference of over 3 cents.

It is also planned to advance the rate 1 cent from St. Louis to New Orleans, which would have the effect of establishing a 19-cent rate from Omaha to New Orleans and an 18-cent rate from river points in southwestern Missouri.

#### TRAVERSE THE ROSEBUD

North-Western Engineers Prepare to Run Line Out of Bonesteel.

Special to The Journal. Norfolk, Neb., April 13.—Seven civil engineers, in the service of the North-Western road, passed thru Norfolk today from Chicago, enroute to Bonesteel, S. D. They were under the leadership of Mr. Stanley, who has long been in the service and who has laid out many new lines of railroad. The men have been ordered to go into the Rosebud field prepared to remain for at least six months. They will not start out of Bonesteel until next week, when their car of equipment will arrive from Chicago.

It is presumed by those who know the situation that the engineers have been sent into the Rosebud territory to lay out an extension of the Bonesteel branch to Pierre, to connect there with the trans-Dakota line to Rapid City. Such a line would tap the best part of the Rosebud. That would also give the North-Western two routes in case the road extends to the Pacific.

#### PLAN AN ELECTRIC LINE

Iowa Capitalists Will Connect Sioux City with Spirit Lake.

Sioux City, Iowa, April 13.—An important meeting of bankers, farmers and representatives of commercial or organizations from points between Sioux City and Spirit Lake was held at the rooms of the Sioux City Commercial club yesterday to consider building an electric line from Sioux City to Spirit Lake.

It was the sentiment of the fifty men present that the line should be built, and that a company should be incorporated. Captain T. W. Gore of Sioux City, an old and experienced railroad contractor, will likely be asked to be president of the company.

There is a heavy passenger travel from northwestern Iowa to Spirit Lake, and it so happens that railroad connections for that point are poor, so that it is believed to be the most promising electric project in northwestern Iowa today.

#### MORE HOMESEEKERS' TRIPS.

Pressure brought to bear on John Sebastian, passenger traffic manager of the Rock Island, has resulted in a reduction of the homeseechers' excursions to the northwest from four times a month to the first and third Tuesdays. The concession is the result of a mass meeting held April 9 in St. Louis.

#### RAILROAD NOTES.

From May 1 to Sept. 1 local freight houses in the twin cities will close Saturdays at 4 p.m. The Great Western road has instituted a new car tracing system on westbound freight between Chicago and western points, by which shipments can learn where their freight is at any time.
