MINNEAPOLIS MAN STABBED

Albin Hanson May Die of Knife Cuts at Billings.

BILLINGS, MONT.—Albin Hanson, a railroad laborer, became engaged in a difficulty with John Lindstrom in this city last evening and was slashed across the upper and back parts of the head with a pocketknife, receiving a dangerous and probably fatal wound. The knifeblade penetrated to its full length, from the back part of the man's ear thru his cheek and down almost to his mouth, severing

the temporal artery and the outer jugular vein, causing Hanson to come very near bleeding to death before the flow could be stanchcd.

The wounded man has been in Billings several months, coming here from Minneapolis, where he has a wife and three children. Lindstrom is in jail.
