Madison, Wis., April 14.—The question of freight rates on the railroads operating in Wisconsin has been placed formally before the state railroad rate commission by Walter Houser, secretary of state. He has filed a formal complaint with the commission, in his capacity of citizen, farmer, stock raiser and dairyman.

The fact that he is a candidate for the republican nomination for a third term leads some political purposes, but it will nevertheless cause the rate commission to investigate the matter of freight rates, give the shippers an opportunity to make answer to this complaint, which is in fact the complaint which the La Follette faction has been making for some time.

FIRST OF LAND FRAUD CASES REPORTED AT SIOUX FALLS.

Four Indictments Aimed at Rancier Charge Perjury in Final Proof Making—Government Holds that Land Was to Be Transferred to Defendant.

SioUX Falls, S. D., April 14.—The United States grand jury has made its first report in the land fraud cases, returning four indictments against Carl Petan, a prominent stockman residing in the ceded Sioux lands between the Missouri river and the Black Hills. In each Petan is charged with perjury, alleged to have been committed while acting as witness for Bertha Franke, Emma Pretzer, Otto T. Tension and Bertha E. Henry, when they made final proof upon government land in the Chamberlain district.

The alleged perjury consisted in Petan testifying as to the term of residence of the parties on the homesteads, the values of their improvements, and that he was not interested in the land embraced in their homestead entries. The government alleges that the land was to be transferred to Petan when final proof had been made, and that in making entry of the land the four persons simply acted for him.
