LATIMER A FREE MAN

Chief Justice Sifton Disgusted by Attitude of American Court.

Calgary, Alta., April 25.—In his order for the release of W. H. Latimer, a celebrated Philadelphia awaiting extradition on a charge of embezzling \$190,000, Chief Justice Sifton makes some caustic remarks.

He points out that Latimer was held in custody from Jan. 25 to April 21, for extradition to the state of Pennsylvania, and that as no action was taken by that state, it was apparent that the provisions of the extradition act had been utilized with some ulterior motive by representatives of the court and that their anxiety for the prosecution of an alleged criminal had materially cooled since the orders were made. Latimer is now a free man.

DUTY CALLED FATHER

General Greely's Daughter "Given Away" by Another.

John Nornith Greely took his father's place.

SNOWSTORM IN MAINE

Fall of Eight to Ten Inches Registered, with Mercury at Freezing Point.

DEADLOCK HELPS HEPBURN'S BILL

Railroad Rate Measure May Pass Senate in Its Original Form.

Washington, April 25.—The lull in the debate on the railway rate bill gives opportunity for conferences among the leaders in the senate on the issues which divide the membership of the body, especially with respect to the passage of the original Hepburn-Dolliver bill in the form in which it passed the house.

Deadlock Helps Measure.

There is no doubt that discussion of this possibility has taken place among the senate leaders within the last few days, and it was based upon the idea that there is no prospect of an agreement among the friends of the bill in its original form and those who favor making such changes in the measure as will tend to insure that it will pass the scrutiny of the courts.

Conferences have been held between President Roosevelt and the friends of a liberal court review amendment to the bill, but no decision was reached beyond the statement by the executive and the staunch supporters of the bill that the Lang amendment represents the ultimatum of the administration leaders by the commission under the bill as it is proposed to be passed.

Favor Court Review Clause.

Senators who are keeping close watch of the situation assert that there has been no change in the sentiment of the senate since the poll was made which indicated thirty-nine votes among the republicans and twelve among the democrats favorable to a liberal court review rather than the review contemplated by the Long amendment or anything like that.

BIGELOW TRUE TO GOLL

CELEBRATED PRISONER TAKES THE BLAME AND SAYS "T'WAS BY MY DIRECTION."

Milwaukee, Wis., April 25.—Frank G. Bigelow, former bank president, but now serving a ten years' sentence at Fort Leavenworth prison as a self-confessed defaulter, was the star witness yesterday in the trial of Henry G. Goll, former assistant cashier of the same bank, charged with making false entries and misapplying funds of the bank.

Mr. Bigelow testified that many of the transactions with which Goll is charged were made with his knowledge and direction.

On cross-examination relative to various checks which Goll is charged with having misapplied, Mr. Bigelow testified that what Goll did was under his directions.

Frank J. Kipp and Thomas E. Clapp, cashiers of the First National bank, identified the handwriting on a dozen checks and credit slips and some drafts as that of Henry G. Goll.

WOMAN KILLS HERSELF BEFORE STREET THROG

Winnipeg, Man., April 25.—Another mysterious suicide occurred here yesterday afternoon, when Feodorovna Stanaski, a prepossessing young married woman, came out on the veranda of her bedroom and drank half a pint of carbolic acid, dying almost immediately before the eyes of horrified spectators in the street, whose attention had been attracted by her screams to the tragedy on the balcony. No cause can be found for her act, as she was apparently living happily with her husband.

URGES ENACTMENT OF IMMUNITY LAW

Attorney General Asks for Legislation Giving Government Right to Appeal.

Washington, April 24.—Strong efforts will be made to have legislation enacted before congress adjourns which will limit the immunity afforded witnesses who testify in criminal cases. The decision of Judge Humphrey has aroused administration officials on this subject and they will exert all possible influence in the direction of having something accomplished at this session.

Attorney General Moody has called the attention of the senate judiciary committee to the recent message of the president, in which Judge Humphrey's decision was characterized as "a miscarriage of justice," and his own statement which accompanied the message. He urged the committee to recommend such a measure as will make a decision similar to that rendered by Judge Humphrey hereafter impossible. He did not mention Judge Humphrey's name, but his meaning was clearly manifested to all the members.

No Limit to Appeal.

In connection with a limitation of immunity, Mr. Moody spoke in favor of legislation giving the government a right to appeal in criminal cases on all questions of law.

Mr. Moody also asked for legislation by which the processes of the district courts may be made effective throughout the United States and not limited to the district in which the warrant is issued, as is the case at present.

STOLE HIS "EXTRA DRY"

Yankton College Students Expelled for Stealing Champagne.

Yankton, S. D., April 25.—Four students prominent in Yankton college and society circles have been expelled for alleged stealing. Two were from Yankton and the others were "up-river" lads.

Much petty thieving has been reported from College hill and nearby residences all winter. One of Yankton's most distinguished citizens reported the loss of thirty pint bottles of champagne and a case of "extra dry" quarts from his residence.

It is said the young men who stole it invited their "co-ed" friends out to a champagne supper.

FIRE IN OHIO MINE

Three Hundred Men Thrown Out of Work by a Blaze.

Salineville, Ohio, April 25.—Three hundred miners were thrown out of work by the complete destruction of the shafts and tipples of the Slope mines of the Ohio and Pennsylvania Coal company here today by fire. The origin is unknown and the loss is heavy.

BALK AT MAXIM GORKY

Ithaca, N. Y., April 25.—It is reported around the hill that the invitation which the university authorities contemplated extending to Maxim Gorky, the Russian revolutionist, to come to Ithaca and speak to the students, will not be issued.
